

thing as rent paid, he believed that in towns such a qualification as he proposed would, in fact, confer the right of voting upon a house which was beyond the character of a mere cabin, and would not exclude any considerable number of the townspeople.

There was another point to which he believed there would not be the same universal assent in the colony, but to which he attached great importance. This was not to continue the House of Assembly as it had been hitherto constituted, but to incorporate with it ten members of the council, so that it would consist of fifteen members elected by the inhabitants of the colony, and ten members nominated by the Crown.

COLONIAL. NEW BRUNSWICK.

St. John Observer, June 21. We learn that an attempt was made on Saturday night last to set fire to the house of R. M. Jarvis, Esq., by removing a panel of the porch door, and throwing in a quantity of combustibles and matches, which fortunately however did not ignite.

UNITED STATES.

Universal Yankee Nation, June 18. Florida Massacre.—The following from the St. Augusta Herald of the 28th ult., seems to give an authentic account of the late horrible barbarities of the Indians in Alachua County on the 14th ult. After the murder of Mr Cassen's family, they attacked the house of Mr Absolom Snowden, and Mr W. H. Ward, as stated in our last, and killed him and three children, and Mrs. S. they wounded in several places and left her for dead.

On the morning of the 17th they killed two soldiers near Wachoootee, and on the same day Lieutenant Britton was in search of the party, and came upon them while in ambush. The Indians fired on his advance, and wounded three men. They fled precipitately. The citizens and troops are in search of them day and night.

INDIAN NEWS.

From the London Sun, June 3. By an Extraordinary Express from Paris we learn that the Overland Mail arrived at Marseilles on Wednesday night. It brings no news from China, nor did we expect any, as sufficient time has not elapsed for conducting the operations which Plenipotentiary Sir H. Pottinger designed to carry on against Peking.—We have important, and to some extent distressing intelligence from Afghanistan. The most painful news is the surrender of the strong fortress of Ghuznee where Colonel Palmer commanded, the celebrated storming of which by General Keane was rewarded by a Peerage and a pension. Compelled by hunger to capitulate, Colonel Palmer agreed to evacuate the town, on a promise for a safe conduct for himself and his men to Cabul.

This is the sad side of the picture. Fortunately, the reverse side presents a more cheering appearance. Col. Pollock has forced the celebrated Khyber Pass, and fortified all the works commanding it, preparatory to marching to the relief of General Sir R. Sale, at Jellalabad. That gallant officer not only held his ground, but made a sortie, in which he routed and killed a considerable body of the enemy. General Knol, at Candahar, made frequent sallies upon the insurgents, in which they invariably had the worst of it. He was in expectation of being joined by General England, with reinforcements.

The possession of the Khyber Pass is some consolation for the loss of Cabul and Ghuznee. It places one of the great gates of the kingdom in our power, to open and shut at our pleasure. We have not yet heard at what sacrifice of human life this advantage was purchased, but we should suppose it considerable. Rumours were afloat that Shah Soojah was poisoned, and that the assassin Akbar Khan was severely wounded. This news, if true, is very important. Shah Soojah could not die at a more propitious moment, as regards the interests of this country. His death would rid us of a treacherous ally, in favor of whom the Indian Government entered into engagements totally at variance with every dictate of sound policy.
