Thing as rent paid, he believed that in towns such a qualification as he proposed would, in fact, confer the right of voting upon a house which was beyond the character of a mere cabin, and would not exclude any considerable number of the townspeople. There was only one other restriction which he proposed, and that was in compliance with a constitutional practice which existed in this country, namely, the re-servation to the crown of all money votes, and this was a step which he deemed it necessary to be taken, in or-der to prevent the undue and improvis dent expenditure of the public money, and upon which he thought that there

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was no difference in the colony itself. There was another point to which he believed there would not be the same believed there would not be the same universal assent in the colony, but to which he attached great importance. This was not to continue the House of Assembly as it had been hitherto con-stituted, but to incorporate with it ten members of the council, so that it would consist of fifteen members elected by the incorporate in the same selected by the inhabitants of the colony, and ten mem-bers nominated by the Crown. He believed that the effect of this alteration would be, that the business of the Legis lature would go on much more harmo-niously, and with much less risk of dis-sention than under the present system. As the Legislature of the colony was at present constituted, one half of the time during which the two houses sat was invariably wasted in discussing the privileges, and dignities, and rights of the respective bodies, and it was for this reason that he proposed this alteration. Sir T. Freemantle seconded the motion.

INDIAN NEWS.

From the London Sun, June 3. By an Extraordinary Express from Paris we learn that the Overland Mail arrived at Marseilles on Wednesday night. It brings no news from China, nor did we expect any. as sufficient time has not elapsed for conducting the operations which Plenipotentiary Sir H. Pottinger designed to carry on against Pekin.--We have important, and to some extent distressing intelligence from Aff-ghanistan. The most painful news is the surrender of the strong fortress of Ghuznee where Colonel Palmer commanded, the celebrated storming of which by General Keane was rewarded by a Peerage and a pension. Compelled by hunger to capitulate, Colonel Palmer agreed to evacuate the town, on a promise for a safe conduct for himself and his men to Ciubal. From this circumstance we may infer that he knew nothing of the destruction of the army commanded by General Elphinstone, and the foul murder of Burns and MeNsghten. The mail which brought the first account of the destruction of our troops in Caubul, brought likewise the news that the Affghans had taken the town of Ghuznee, and that Colonel Palmer was shut up with a single Sepoy regiment in the Citadel, with provisions for six months. The probability is, that he had not supplies for one third of the time. The snow was then very deep, and the Sepoys, accustomed to the mild climate of Hindostan, were auffering dreadfully from the cold. That so strong a fortress should have been left in so weak a state of defence, is very discreditable to the Brftish authorities in Affghanistan.

This is the sad side of the picture. For-tunately, the reverse side presents a more cheering appearance. Col. Pollock has forced the celebrated Khyber Pass, and fortified all the works commanding it, prepara-tory to marching to the relief of General Sir R. Sale, at Jellalabad. That gallant officer not only held his ground, but made a sortie, in which be routed and killed a considerable body of the enemy. General Knot, at Candahar, made frequent sellies upon the insurgents, in which they invariably had the worst of it. He was in expectation of being joined by General England, with re-inforcements. inforcements.

The possession of the Khyber Pass is some consolation for the loss of Caubul and Ghuznee. It places one of the great gates of the kingdom in our power, to open and shut at our pleasure. We have not yet heard at what sacrifice of human life this advantage with earth of the this

advantage was purchased, but we should uppose it considerable. Rumours were afloat that Shah Soojah was poisoned, and that the assassin Akhbar Khan was severely wounded.
