Boston Mail, January 1.

Horrible Murder of a Wife by her Husband in New York.

The coroner on Thursday night held an inquest at the house of Mrs Elizabeth Tanner, No. 212, Wooster street, corner of Amity lane, New York, on the body of Mrs Ann Adams, a native of England, aged 49 years, who was inhumanly murdered by her husband. From the evidence adduced before the Coroner's inquest, it appeared that James Adams, the husband and murderer of the deceased occupied apartments in a rear building in Amity lane, next to the corner of Wooster street, where he and his family resided. He was a native of England, a man of intemperate habits, and worked for Mr Leach, the Street inspector of the 15th Ward—while his wife was a sober, steady and industrious woman, despoising her earnings in the savings' bank. On Thursday evening about half after 5 o'clock Adams who was in the habit of beating his wife, came home drunk and commenced abusing a girl named Ann Gorham, who was setting the supper table for the family, by calling her odious names, throwing a plate at her head and saying he would have her life. Mrs Adams hearing the noise from the backyard, where she was, entered the house and asked her husband why he had thrown the plate? When he replied he would serve her so likewise, and would have the lives of both of them. She then told him she would have him taken up. When he rushed upon her with a large carving knife, he had taken from the table, and plunged it four inches deep into her right breast; drawing it out, he again thrust it with great violence through her corset board of the centre of the breast bone, until it penetrated the right ventricle of the heart, inflicting a fatal wound. The wounded lady screamed murder, again and again when the monster left her and pursued Ann Gorham with the knife, but she escaped by jumping through the rear window into the yard, and ran round into Wooster street, to the house of Mrs Tanner. There Mrs Adams followed, gory with her own blood and her life rapidly ebbing away, and after being seated some eight or ten minutes, expired. Soon after the physician had arrived, Mr Leach, the street inspector, having been sent for, came, and arresting Adams, conducted him to the Upper Police Office, where he was yesterday examined before the Coroner, and fully committed for trial. Des Dosslyn and Roberts made a post mortem examination of the body, and the Jury found as a verdict, that Mrs Adams came to her death by stabs inflicted upon her person by her husband, James Adams, this day.

Colonial.

NOVA-SCOTIA.

Halifax Times, January 25.

Mr Dickens.—This talented author in a peculiar walk of literature, arrived in the Britannia steam ship on Thursday, on his way to the United States. He accompanied the Honble. Speaker to his residence, and was present at the opening of the Assembly. Mr Dickens is a good looking young man, with one of those countenances, bearing that resemblance to everybody, which almost tempts the stranger to assume an acquaintance. We could almost have sworn we had seen Mr Dickens some fifty times within the last month, if the certainty were not so positive that this was his first trip across the Atlantic.

House of Assembly.—We presume the Session will not be a long one, and that the Responsible Administration will be very careful in this, the outset of their careers, not to bring any measures before the Assembly, that shall create much difference of opinion. Mr Huntingdon's Bill, legalizing the double-loon, sovereign and dollar at their present rate, passed the House yesterday. The bill abolishing the Registrar's fees and submitting a salary, has also passed. Hon. Mr Uniacke's Bill for abolishing imprisonment for debt, is before the House.

An attempt is now making towards getting a Whaling Association in Halifax, which we hope will succeed. The enterprise could scarcely fail to be of the greatest importance to the country. It is now proposed to reduce the Shares to £10 each, that they may come within the reach of all.

BRITISH TIMBER MARKET.

LIVERPOOL TIMBER MARKET, January 4.

Pine.—Although we are not able to announce any actual improvement in the price of Pine Timber, yet we perceive evident indications that such improvement will shortly take place, and a pretty general impression that the present depressed rates will not much longer be continued. Quebec cargoes have been sold at 16d to 16½d per foot. St. John cargoes of 48 and 50 feet average, have brought 18½d per foot, and cargoes of larger average 19½d to 20d per foot. A cargo from Dalhousie brought 18d per foot, and a small parcel of St. Andrew's Pine has been sold at 14½ per foot.

Red Pine.—Quebec Red Pine brings 22d to 2s per foot. Richibucto has been sold at 18d per foot, and St John with the cargo, at 15d, 15½d and 16d per foot.

Birch.—St John Birch is worth 16d to 18d per foot, and Pictou brings in cargo 14d to 14½d per foot.

Deals.—A cargo of St. John Deals has been sold at 2½d per foot for the Spruce, and 2½d per foot of 2 inches for the yellow, with the cargo as stowage; several parcels of Spruce have been sold at 2d per foot of 2 in. but Deals generally are in request, and higher prices are obtained.

REPEAL OF THE U. S. BANKRUPT LAW.—A Bill to Repeal the Bankrupt Law passed the House of Representatives on the 17th January.

NEW EPISCOPAL CHURCH.—The frame of an extensive edifice, intended for an Episcopal Church, was raised yesterday in Portland parish. It is situated on the other side of the Mill Pond, in the vicinity of the extensive lots owned by his Honor the Chief Justice, who has been pleased to present the Church in Portland the lot upon which the new building is erected.—St. John paper.
