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RULES AND REGULATIONS For the Establishment of a Loan and Labour Fund in each County, proposed to be raised by a Society to be called "The Land and Emigration Society of the County of \_\_\_\_\_."

Emigration Society of the County of At a period when distress is so prevalent throughout the Country from the failure of the ordinary resources on which the people have depended for subsistence, and when conse-quently the difficulty of obtaining employment, and, to the employers of paying for the labour required on their Farms, may injure the pros-pects of a good harvest, it is proposed to raise a fund from which every inhabitant having a demand for labour on his Farm, may derive immediate accommodation. The ordinary Form work at the pre-ent time and thil the immediate accommodation. The ordinary Farm work at the pre-ent time and til the hay harvest, being chiefly in hoeing and weeding, it is probable that many persons, men, women, and children, could be advantageously employed at once, and continuously throughout

The wages of labour, it is proposed, should be fixed at 1s. 6d. a day for men, 1s. for men, and 6d. for boys and girls under 12 years of age, and able to perform light work. The labourers also to be subsisted, and their wages to be raid weakly in process. to be paid weekly in money.

All persons desirous of procuring labourers on these terms, are to send in to the Treasurer or Treastees of the respective County Societies, their names, specifying the number of labour-ers, (men, women, and children) whom they desire to employ, and for what period at those rates—from which return the amount required to be advanced may be estimated. It being understood that such persons are to give secu-rity in themselves and one collateral security for the sum, as a loan, to be repaid to the for the sum, as a loan, to be repaid to the Trus ees, with interest, at 6 per cent per annum, at the end of three months from the

date of the advance when made. When sixty pounds have been subscribed and lodged in the hands of the Treasurer or Trastees of a county Society, the premium of  $\pounds 60$ , granted for Emigration Societies, to be applied for. This fund in twelve counties will amount to £720, and the Government to be requested under the circumstances specially to authorize the payment in cash to the Trus-tees on the terms of the Grant.

This Emigration premium of  $\pounds 60$  in each County to be employed in co-operation with the Labour Fond, in defraying the expenses of Emigrant Labourers and families in proceeding to those parts of the country where labor offers for them and to be ended the country of the second definition.

FREDELICTON, 27th June, 1842. SIR-After an an attentive consideration of the several answers with which I have been favored by the Members of Assembly to whom my Circular of the 3rd instant was addressed, I take the earliest opportunity of explaining to you the circumstances in which the government have been placed, and which I apprehend will render it impracticable to meet the wishes which have been so generally expressed for the immediate application of funds to the improvement of the Roads, under the appropriation of the last session.

No provision having been made by the Legislature for raising funds to meet the liabil-ities of the Province, it was ascertained at the close of the session, that an arrear of more than £80,000 had become chargeable on the Revenués of the current year, and as in the pressure on the money market, the Banks, already largely in advance to the government already largely in advance to the government, were unable to afford a further accommodation to the extent of the appropriations, without to the extent of the appropriations, without curtailing their Banking accommodations to the country, at present so urgently required, an attempt was made to relieve the pressure by the issue of Warrants, on which the legal interest would be payable half yearly. In the last year the Warrants were issued, under a pledge to priority of payment, whereby the Revenue of the current year was anticipated and as a such pladge agaid saying be guest

and as no such pledge could again be given, it was considered just that the payment of Interest on the future debt should not be deferred

From the state of the public credit, howe-ver, the measure has altogether failed, and as no capitalist has been willing to come forward where there is no provision for the redemption of the debt, it has become necessary to sus-pend these issues, which, without the consent of the holders of the old Warrants to relin-quish their claim to priority, could not be taken
