

and they will use them in their own defence, but never will give them up. Look out for news from the Far West.

Temperance in New York.—Mr. Hartly, the late Corresponding Secretary of the New York City Temperance Society, has recently made a report of the progress of this cause in the city. He states that the number of names enrolled is 179,624, of whom 120,000 have taken the total abstinence pledge. In this aggregate is included 237 clergymen, 429 physicians, 4976 Germans, 900 colored persons, 13,380 seamen, and 23,300 Irish, Protestants, and Roman Catholics.

New York, Aug. 4.—*Flour cheaper.*—The large houses have been selling good brands Genesee at \$5.75, and are still sellers beyond the demand. No change in grain—good Wheat commands \$1.25; Rye 66 cents; Corn 55 cents for 56lbs. for flat, and 60 to 62 cents measure for round.

New Wheat. New Flour.—A very handsome specimen of new wheat was taken to the custom grist mill of Messrs. J. McMillan & Co. of Rochester, on the 23rd inst., by Daniel Budd, of Greece. This is the first ground in Rochester this season.

Two more of the Van Dieman's Laid prisoners have arrived in this country, viz., Samuel Chandler and Wait. They were captured at the Short Hills, in Canada, in 1837.

A Slave Stealer.—An old man named Jackson having been detected in stealing slaves from Kentucky, was caught, and committed to prison at Warsaw, Ohio, in default of procuring bail for \$2,000. The punishment for this offence is 20 years imprisonment.

SOUTH AMERICA.

More Trouble in Brazil.—By the schr. Ohio, Smyley, of Newport, from Rio Janeiro, 22nd June, we learn that an insurrection had broken out at St. Paul's, about 300 or 400 miles from Rio. It was reported that a large body of men, from 1800 to 2200, were within 40 miles of Rio. Government had sent a force against them, and some skirmishing had taken place. Several persons, suspected of being favorable to the insurrection, had been arrested at Rio; a great many houses had been searched, and all the sums found therein, were taken possession of by the Government.

Peru.—Information has been received by way of Panama from Callao, to April 21. Lafuente had been poisoned, and the Bolivian army was marching towards Lima.

TEXAS.

An Engagement with the Mexicans.—A courier arrived at Houston from Lipantitlan on the 14th inst., bringing despatches from Gen. Davis, commander of the forces at that post, in which the particulars of an action with the Mexicans is detailed. We give an extract from General Davis' letter to the Texan Secretary of War, Colonel Hockley.

Head Quarters Texan Volunteers, Camp Lipantitlan, July 7, 1842. This morning about daylight, the enemy, seven hundred strong, entered our old encampment, and in a few minutes attacked us in our new position, which they kept up for about 20 minutes, and then made a hasty retreat. Three Mexicans were left dead on the field, and from their trails

many were dragged off; their killed and wounded could not have been less than thirty men. I am happy to inform you that we had not a man either killed or wounded.

The War Bill has passed the house of Representatives, and it is said would pass the Senate on Saturday last by a vote of 7 to 5. Gen. Houston himself, so it is reported, is opposed to an offensive war, or in other words to invasion, but a large majority of the people are against him.
