NEW-BRUNSWICK.

St. John Observer, April 12.

Fire at Melgrove, Shediac.—We regret to learn that on Tuesday morning, the 22 ult. the dwelling at Melgrove, and outhouses attached, were destroyed by this devastating element. Doctor and Mrs. Theal were awoke at about the break of day by the cry of fire, and in fifteen minutes after scarce a vestige of these costly buildings remained. The children were instantly removed wrapped in the sheets in which they slept, and by the aid of several of the neighbours a portion of the Furniture and Library were saved. The fire originated in a long outbuilding at the east of the dwelling house, and connected with it by a porch—the southern end about to be used as a Surgery and Library—the centre for store rooms, and the north end was being fitted for a summer kitchen. The cause of the fire is unknown, but it is supposed a coal must have fallen from one of the workmen's pipes, four of whom were working near and passing to and from the kitchen through the long building so late as seven o'clock the evening prior, smoking their pipes. The whole of these buildings were lately erected by Doctor Theal, and the house was finished throughout in a superior style; neither pains nor expense had been spared to render it one of the most comfortable and substantial wood buildings in the Province: and it stood an ornament to the Parish of Shediac. The loss is a total one to the proprietor, Doctor Wm. Y. Theal, there being no insurance on the premises for the last ten months. The wind had been from the North West during the night, but changed suddenly about five minutes after the discovery of the fire, to the East. Had the fire happened early in the morning, or the wind been from the East during the night, the chance would have been but small for the family to have escaped. The sleeping rooms were at the West, which would only have admitted of throwing themselves from a window, a distance of fifteen feet, whilst the servants slept at the east, and these rooms were filling with a thick smoke and flame when alarmed; besides, the boy, who slept below, in his confusion made his way to the door leading into the porch, which caused the eastern rooms to be speedily filled with smoke.

A Foundry, called the 'Phoenix Foundry,' has been established at Charlotte Town, P. E. Island, by a Company, under the patronage of the Lieutenant Governor.

The Philadelphia Sentinel contradicts, by authority, the report that duty was charged on the cargo of Ice recently brought from Halifax; and states that Ice is no longer considered by the officers of the customs as subject to duty, when brought from foreign ports.

NOVA-SCOTIA.

Novascotian, April 13.

Sir Wm. Colebrooke, it is said, intends to present silver medals to such of the Indians as shall have kept the Temperance Pledge during the period of twelve months.

Advices from Havana state that business was very dull there, but that recent regulations respecting the Slave Trade had been effectual, and will be a source of relief and protection to the Island. A Spanish brig of war, brought in a Slaver early in March,—her cargo was to be emancipated. This is the first of such acts by a Spanish vessel.—These movements in Cuba are a noble extension of the British doctrines of abolition of slavery.

PR. ED. ISLAND.

Charlotte Town Herald, April 2.

On Wednesday evening, a disturbance took place at the Wellington Hotel, at about 10 o'clock, when great violence was used towards the inmates of the house, one of whom had his fingers severely bitten. Wm. Candall, Esq. J. P. was called on, and meeting the parties outside, was severely beaten by them, as was likewise Moses Hayes, a constable, who was pursued down the street where he resides. On his wife hearing his cries she ran out, when she was stabbed by one of the ruffians, and her life is considered in danger. Informations were

sworn before Donald Macdonald and William Swabey, Esqrs. against such of the parties as are known, and warrants issued for their apprehension; and it is hoped the miscreants who committed this entirely unprovoked outrage, will be speedily brought to justice.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has called the attention of the House of Assembly to the subject, and a reward of Fifty pounds has been offered for the apprehension of the person who visited Mrs Hayes.
