Survey of the Coast.—Visit of His Excellency to the Northern Section of the Province.—It will be seen by the following information, for which we are indebted to the St. John New Brunswick, that the inhabitants of Gloucester, Restigouche, and we hope Northumberland too, are shortly to be honored with a visit from His Excellency Sir Wm. Colebrooke. We hope Sir William's visit will prove of some advantage to this valuable portion of New-Brunswick.

"We are informed that the Government steamer Columbia, under the command of Lieut. Kortright, may be expected here in a few days, for the purpose of being employed for some time, in the Admiralty Survey of the Bay of Fundy. Immediately after the arrival of this steamer, Captain Owen, who will superintend the survey, intends proceeding in her to the Gulf of St. Lawrence, for the purpose of meeting Captain Bayfield, who has been for some years engaged in the survey of the Gulf, to settle the position of certain prominent points, to serve as a base line for carrying on their several surveys.—We hear that His Excellency the Lieut. Governor intends to avail himself of this opportunity of visiting the whole of the Eastern coast of this Province, joining the steamer at Bay Verte or Shediac, and then proceeding Northerly to the Bay of Chaleur, and to the extent of his Government on the Restigouche. His Excellency will thus have an opportunity of visiting a part of the Province, which has hitherto been greatly overlooked, and we have no doubt, the proposed visit will be of advantage to that part of the country."

Advantages to New-Brunswick by the settlement of the Boundary Line.—The New-Brunswicker, in an article on the proposed loan by the city authorities, &c., concludes with the following remarks:

"Next in point of importance is the adjustment of the Boundary question, thereby throwing open to the operations of the lumberer, a tract of land containing some of the largest and most valuable timber in the world, and which will always command a good price in the English market. Already have persons of capital from the U. States turned their attention to this Province. One gentleman who arrived in the steamer on Monday from Boston, has proceeded up the river to fix a site for the erection of Mills. Another is now on his way to the Coal Field in Westmorland County, for the purpose of making an examination of this field. It will be recollected that a Company in Boston entered into arrangements with the Province, during the administration of Sir John Harvey, for opening this mine, but want of funds, we believe, was the reason why it was not opened before. A person has however been sent on by the Company, who are now making arrangements for commencing operations immediately. We repeat, therefore, that an encouraging prospect is before us, and that by perseverance, and an economical system of conducting our public affairs, past mismanagement may be atoned for, and the province attain an eminence corresponding to its resources."

Bright Prospects.—The St. John Herald, of Sept. 2, gives the following cheering intelligence to its readers. That the Editor's anticipations may come to pass, is an event anxiously looked for:

"We have from a gentleman in this city, that in advance of the contemplated operations of the Americans, on the recently Disputed Territory, that Goods to the amount of £400 were purchased in this city during the present week, and for which cash was paid, for the supply of persons engaged in the Lumbering trade in that district. This looks well, and from general opinion and general rumour, we think we may safely pro-

mise our fellow citizens, that the darkest cloud of our adversities has passed over, and that the full sunshine of prosperity is again about to burst on us in all its splendour. The boundary question being settled, must as a natural consequence, stimulate to action the restless enterprise of our neighbours of Maine, and that in the coming spring a scene of activity never before witnessed, in this port, may be looked for."

Newspaper Dispatch.—On Monday afternoon last, Sept. 5, about four o'clock, we obtained by the Southern Stage, the Boston Yankee Nation, of Saturday, September 3, 1842. We read the date of this paper several times before we could believe its correctness. This paper must have travelled over 500 miles in less than 60 hours, including 200 miles of land carriage.

Collector of Excise.—The Halifax Times, of Tuesday last, says—the Hon. Joseph Howe, of Halifax, was to be sworn in as Collector of Excise, that day, vacant by the death of the Hon. H. N. Binney.

SABBATH SCHOOL PIC NIC.

On Tuesday afternoon, the 6th inst., a number of the children attending the Sabbath Schools in connection with the Scottish Church, Bathurst, assembled at Somerset Vale, the estate of Hugh Munro, Esquire. Most of the Teachers, and a few friends, were present, with about fifty children, male and female. After singing the 23rd Psalm, that inspired ode composed by Israel's Shepherd King, whose sacred strains are so sweet and simple that even the child, when instructed in religion, can, with cordial intelligence, enter into their spirit, while yet they are so solemn and sublime as to awaken all the best affections of the heart, and all the most vigorous powers of the understanding of the mature christian. After offering this song of holy praise to the Divine Shepherd of Israel, and by prayer invoking the blessing from on high, the young guests partook of Tea, and a variety of refreshments. When abundantly satisfied, they dispersed for a short time, and amused themselves amidst the exquisite rural scenery with which they were surrounded. Soon the flight of time discovered by the progression of the hour hand from five, proclaimed that all must again think of their own homes, the juvenile company were assembled, and the 16th Scripture Paraphrase having been sung, with prayer and thanksgiving, they retired, joyful and delighted with their entertainment.

This, it is believed, is the first occasion upon which any thing like a Sabbath School Pic Nic has been attempted in the neighbourhood of Bathurst. It is therefore the more pleasing to be able to add that all who witnessed it were highly gratified with the happy manner in which it succeeded. The spot selected for spreading the rustic table was extremely felicitous, forming an enclosure of beautiful bowers provided by nature, and in sight, at the distance of only a few yards, the gently flowing waters of the Tettagouche, gliding past, irrigating and adorning the fertile valley.

The great object of such parties is to combine pleasure with profit,—rational pleasure with religious profit; to promote the love and fear of God in connection with healthful amusement. Thus may these who are in the morning of life be taught and trained that "whether they eat or drink, or whatever they do, they should do all to the glory of God." European News.—On our second page we have continued European extracts from late papers obtained by the Caledonia.

The number of passengers who arrived at Quebec to 25th August, this year, is 39,998.—To the same date last year the number was 21,250.

The tonnage of the shipping arrived at Quebec to the 20th Aug. this year, is 193,000 tons; to same period last year, 298,847—being a deficiency this year of 105,847 tons.

Wheat Flour.—The Market the past week has been very unsettled. At several Public Sales Canada would not average over 32s. and a lot was stopped on Saturday at 30s. Holders of Am. Superfine, are demanding 32s. 6d. in bond, but we have not heard of any Sales since our last. A lot of Canada this day only averaged 27s. 6d.

Corn Meal.—The Stock is not large, and sales at 19s. 6d. a 20s. according to quantity.

Rye Flour.—Scarce—rate 26s. 3d.

Sugar.—Has rather improved since our last, and lots of bright for exportation have brought 23s. 9d. a 24s.—some holders are stiff at 25s. but this latter is for lots that are well drained—the demand for second and third qualities is very limited.

Molasses.—Stock light and Sales of good Porto Rico during the week have been made at 1s. 1d. in bond, and the holders of the remainder of these lots are firm at this rate—inferior quality can be had at a shade less.

Fish.—Accounts from the eastward show that the catch of either Dry or Pickled have not been so great as imagined. The rate from store this day may be quoted, Cod 12s, Merchantable 14s, Scale 5s 6d, No. 3 Mackerel 21s. 3d., Herring 15s, No. 1 Salmon 55s, city inspection; Alewives, No 1, 18s 9d.

BY THIS DAY'S MAIL.

Monday, 4 o'clock, P. M. The Southern Stage has just arrived. The following is a summary of the news it brings:

St. John Courier, September 10.
The Bankrupt Law.—The act relating to Bankruptcy in this Province passed at the last session of the legislature, and forwarded to England for Her Majesty's approval, was specially confirmed, ratified, and finally enacted by her Majesty in Council, at the Court at Buckingham Palace on the 11th August, and was published and declared in New Brunswick on Wednesday last, the 7th September.

An Act to increase the Representation of the County of Restigouche from one to two members has also received the Royal Assent, and is published in the Royal Gazette of Wednesday last.

The act to limit the duration of the Provincial Assembly to four years, and to raise the qualification of members, has received the Royal assent and is now become a law. An immediate dissolution of the House of Assembly we presume, will therefore take place, and for some weeks the Province will reap the benefits of a general election.

Fish.—The fine fat Mackerel (bloters) they have for several years past deserted our shores, have again returned in myriads. We understand from persons conversant with the matter, that the Bay of Fundy is literally alive with mackerel and herring of the finest kind. The Carleton and City fishermen are overhauling their gaspereaux nets for a campaign on the waters. 'Look out and spread your nets with care' appears to be the watch word. From the preparations making and the abundance of the finny tribe, we may reasonably look for 'a great catch.'

The Treaty.—The National Intelligencer, published at Washington, says, 'Several of the Northern papers have published what is stated to be the articles of the late treaty negotiated in this city between the United States and England. The treaty has not yet been published by authority, nor have we learned that the injunction of secrecy has as yet been removed by the Senate.' A vast amount of indignation and fault-finding has thus been unnecessarily thrown away. Better to wait and be sure of understanding a thing rightly, before we say anything about it.

SYDNEY, c. B. August 30.—Emigration.—The tide of Emigration, it gives us pleasure to state, continues to flow steadily towards our shores. The brig Salus arrived on Saturday evening from Stornoway, having on board 244 passengers; and on the following morning the ship Hercules: from the same place, with 406 passengers.
