#### THE FRENCH ELECTIONS.

We elsewhere publish the intelligence re-  
specting the French elections received in Paris  
yesterday. It appears from these statements  
that the Conservatives have a majority over  
the Opposition on the returns already known.  
But it must not be considered that all the Con-  
servatives returned will be partisans of the  
existing Administration, whose continuance in  
power all who are anxious for amicable rela-  
tions between France and Great Britain most  
desire, however their moral influence, or their  
power to carry out any great measure for inter-  
national advantage, may be doubted, in conse-  
quence of their improper yielding to the factions  
pressure which induced them to promulgate  
the ordinance against our linen and yarns.  
There can be little doubt that, however the  
numbers may appear, and although it may  
seem that the balance of parties may be pretty  
much the same as it was in the last Chambers,  
the reality may prove widely different. In  
the first place, there is little doubt that the  
Legitimists will, generally speaking, join the  
present Opposition, and they have gained  
considerably in this election; secondly, as we  
have already mentioned, it is calculated even  
by the Ministerialists that many of the Con-  
servatives will keep clear of any pledges to  
support altogether the policy or the measures  
of the Soult-Guizot Government; and lastly,  
the signal defeat of the Cabinet candidates in  
Paris cannot fail to tell very seriously against  
the Ministry. This clearly tells the feeling of  
the people of the metropolis,—and it is pretty  
well known how extensively the opinions of  
the electors of Paris influence the existence  
of French cabinets, and that, unless they  
become sufficiently pliable to bend to the  
prevailing passion, they cannot hope to with-  
stand it.

So far as we can frame an opinion from the  
returns before us, we believe that the majority  
will be one guided by the Court, that Louis  
Philippe will be omnipotent in the Chambers;  
and that he can readily kick the beam towards  
which ever side may please him. Now, the  
shadow cast before the intended course of  
action of the French Monarch is visible in the  
declaration of the Belgian Minister of Finance  
last week, that a convention would be im-  
mediately signed, which would dispel all fears  
for the prosperity of the manufactures of Bel-  
gium in consequence of the French ordinance.  
It is clear, from every indication from which  
any results can be derived, that the intentions  
of the French Monarch are at present as  
unfavorable to the commercial relations of this  
country as a seeming desire to keep on terms  
of amity with Great Britain will permit; and  
we have little doubt, if the Soult Cabinet  
should refuse to lend itself to such measures  
as Louis Philippe may consider likely to ensure  
for him the largest share of popularity for the  
time, that he will, ere long, hand them over  
to a majority against them, created by himself,  
in the Chambers. 'To this complexion must  
they come' in the course of the next session  
we feel confident, and we trust that the British  
Government will, in the meantime, exert its  
ability, influence, and resources to meet the  
difficulties which have already arisen, and  
which may yet result from such a train of  
events.

With regard to commercial affairs in connec-  
tion with them, we shall anxiously view the  
progress of the new tariff in the Portuguese  
Legislature,—but other negotiations should net  
for a moment be lost sight of.

#### THE REVENUE.

The Revenue Returns made up to the 5th  
instant, present what, under the present cir-  
cumstances of the country, we must consider  
an unquestionably favorable aspect,—namely,  
an increase on the year over that ending July  
5, 1841, of £665,175. It is true that by far  
the larger portion of this sum is set down  
under the head 'Miscellaneous,' and that,  
therefore, it is difficult to assign to it its real  
value as a symptom of steadiness or improve-  
ment, but, taking into account the injurious  
effect of uncertainty, and of that state of  
excitement, anxiety, and transition, through  
which the country passed since the correspond-  
ing period of last year, we think we may  
decidedly pronounce the present returns to be  
highly satisfactory, as containing indications  
relative to the distressed condition of the  
people of a far less gloomy character than the  
Opposition leaders and organs would fain have  
us believe. There is, we regret to say, a  
trifling decrease on the quarter compared with
