

immediately, but the Prince did not recover his consciousness. Dr. Baunty, happening to be on the spot, gave every assistance to Dr. Pasquier, his Royal Highness's physician who had come from Paris.

A clergyman of St. Phillippe du Roule, and the cure of Neuilly were called in; but could only administer extreme unction.

The Prince died at three o'clock, at the house to which he had been carried, No. 4, in the Chemin de la Revolte. The body was removed to the Chateau de Neuilly, and placed in the chapel.

The Duc d'Aumale, who was at Courbevoie, as soon as he heard of the accident that had happened, set off in a hired cabriolet. This carriage broke down on the road, and the Prince was obliged to continue his route on foot to see his dying brother.

The late Prince had testified the greatest pleasure at his intended voyage, for which great preparations had been made in the various towns through which he was to pass. He was to have taken the command of a camp of 40,000 men, but who can calculate on the morrow.

Nothing can exceed the sensation produced by this news say our private letters. The death of universally beloved Prince was regarded as a national calamity. The streets of Paris were crowded, and grief was painted in every face.

The Belgian Government has suffered a loss of 111,000 francs by the first transatlantic voyage of the British Queen. It is calculated that, including wear and tear, insurance, and interest of capital, the loss upon four voyages will be 820,000 francs, exclusive of pay and provisions for fifty men of the Belgian navy, which are paid by the War departments.

From China.—By the Great Liverpool, from Alexandria we have received private letters from China, which mention the return of Sir Henry Pottinger to Hong Kong from Macao and his intention to join the expedition in the north in ten days, and proceed with it to Peking. The general opinion at Macao was, that the Plenipotentiary was resolved to take all responsibility on himself and direct the most decisive measures to be adopted to bring the war to a close by a simultaneous attack on Peking by the land and sea forces. The Plenipotentiary's well known firmness of purpose, and his tact in keeping the naval and military authorities in good humour, promise the most happy results, and we may soon expect to hear of the British flag being planted in Peking, and the Emperor of China having acceded to the reasonable terms our arms have been sent to enforce. We have good reason for stating that two or three of the most important positions for trade will be retained, and that a large naval and military force will be permanently stationed in China for the future security of British commerce.—Naval and Military Gazette.

The semi-annual meeting of the proprietors of the Colonial Bank took place on the 5th. A dividend was declared at the reduced rate of 2 1/2 per cent. on the capital paid up for the half-year.

Ships Erebus and Terror, belonging to the South Pole Expedition, got at the end of last February, within one hundred miles of Frankland Island, where a landing was effected last year.

The Income tax having come into operation, commissioners are being appointed in all the principal towns to assess the duty.
