bitants. The sailors are very much frost bitten in their hands and feet, and the captain very bad with a severe pain across his chest. The mate and the remainder of the crew were shortly afterwards taken from on board the ship, all well.

E. on Monday night, the 28th, and Tuesday's tide, the George Ramsay beat very heavily on the stones, unshipped her rudder, damaged the trunkway, and considerably hurt her bottom; a part of the after keel is gone, and the water ws in and out at every rise and fall of the

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The barque Enterprise, Dawson, hence on the 17th ult. for Liverpool, was lost on the Manicousgan Shoals, on Thursday night, the 24th Nov. The crew arrived at Cacona in the long boat, and being worn out with hardship and cold, were saved by the exertions of the crew of the George Ramsay.

Halifax, Dec. 10, arrived—Schr. Defiance, Currie, from Miramichi, 12 days.

The ship Banfishire, Eady, 10 days from Quebec, for Cork, with a cargo of deals, was assisted into Port Hood, by Wm. Watts, and others, being water legged, and having lost jib boom, main and mizen topsails, decks swept, and radde shi and rodder chains broken. Besides her crew, she has a serjeant and four soldiers on board.

The brig Alfred, Capt. Richard Pearse, from Georgetown P. E. Island, bound to Bristol, England, having on board a cargo of deals and timber, was totally wrecked on Cow Paint, Cape Breton, on the merning of the 29th alt., during a heavy gale of wind from the Northwest. The captain, crew, and passengers were enabled to get on shore in safety after being exposed on the wreck a day and night, with the sea washing completely over

them.
The brig Catherine Fraser, Fish, hence for Picton, ashore near Canso about 24th ult.—
Yessel total loss—crew and materials saved.
The schr Edward & Samuel, McDaniel, of St. Mary's, was totally lost near Sydney, on the 1st inst, and every sonl on board perished—7 in number, including some passengers.
The schr Isabella, Martin, from Miramichi for Halifax, in ballast, was totally lost at St. Peter's Island, P. E. I., on 29th ult—crew saved.

Boston, Dec. 3. Melancholy Shipwrecks.— The new barque Isadore, Captain Leander Foss, belonging to Kennebunk, Me, sailed thence on Wednesday morning, 30th alt for New Orleans, and was totally lost in the E. S. E. gale, same night, on Maxwell's Beach, near Cape Neddock, York, Me. Every person on board, fourteen or fifteen in number, perished! They were all young men belonging to Kennebunk. The vessel was 395 tons burthen, was owned by several shipmasters of Kennebank, including captain Foss, was valued at \$22,500, and insured for \$22,000 at one office

in this city.
On the same night, the schr James Clark, On the same night, the schr James Clark, Capt. Beck, of and from St. John, via Portland, for this port, went ashore on Rye Beact, N. H., and 6 passengers perished. Their names were Daniel Mahoney, — Barry, a Lady, and her daughter five years old a child of Mrs. Stewart, and a little girl named Peggy. The vessel is a total loss, with her cargo of potatoes, old iron, and laths. Captain Beck was confined to his bed at Pottsmouth: three of the crew have arrived in the city, a free of the crew have arrived in the city, a free passage having been given them on the eastern railroad.

Great credit and praise is due to Mr Yeaton and son, for their unwearied exertions in saving these people at the imminent risk of their lives; but for their aid, many more would have perished. His family, 100, have done all that humanity could demand. Their house has been exacted and their clothing been freely has been opened, and their clothing been freely distributed to the poor sufferers, who have now lost nearly everything they had, except the clothing they had on, and some were nearly naked,—they had really 'fed the hungry and clothed the naked.' Heaven will andoabtedly bless them, for such shall have their reward.
