

solemn declaration of their submission to the Queen,—having released the prisoners, whether soldiers or civilians,—having given up the cannon captured, as well as those belonging to themselves, and having restored all public as well as private property seized by them,—the Lieutenant Colonel, acting under the powers vested in him by the Governor, granted a general amnesty or free pardon to all persons who might have been engaged in resistance to Her Majesty's troops and authority, with the exception of Joachim Prinsle, A. W. Pretorius, J. J. Burger, Michael van Breda, and Servaas van Breda.

He further declared, that all private property should be respected,—that the emigrant farmers should be allowed to return to their farms, with their guns and horses,—that they should be defended from any attack by the Zoolahs,—that the tenure of their lands should not be interfered with, pending the determination and settlement of Her Majesty's Government,—that beyond the limits fixed for the military occupation, their existing Administration and civil institutions should not be interfered with till the pleasure of Her Majesty should be made known,—that the Caffres should not be molested in the occupation of the lands on which they were settled at the date of the arrival of Her Majesty's troops, subject to such future arrangements as may be made for general security by Her Majesty; and by a subsequent article appended to the conditions of this surrender, the Lieutenant Colonel in consideration of Mr. A. W. Pretorius having co-operated in the final adjustment of the articles of surrender, and of his personal humane conduct to the prisoners, and his general moderation, included him in the amnesty which he had extended to all with the exceptions above named.

BY YESTERDAY'S MAIL.

CANADA.—Kingston papers state that the Governor General was very seriously indisposed; and a Montreal paper of the 12th inst. says that an express arrived in that city on the preceding day, for Dr. Crawford to proceed at once to the seat of government, to attend his Excellency. There was a rumour in Quebec when the Unicorn left for Halifax (so says the Morning Herald) that His Excellency was dead.

A slight shock of an Earthquake was felt at Three Rivers, William Henry, and other places.

HALIFAX.—The bark Catharine, owned by Mr Skimmings, and lying at his wharf, received considerable damage by fire. Nothing has been elicited respecting its origin.

The Recorder says—
Four sea going steamships have arrived at this port since Tuesday. First, the Acadia from Liverpool; next we have the Unicorn and Sydenham from Quebec, and yesterday the Caledonia from Boston. During the ensuing winter three steamships will remain inactive in the harbour, viz: the Margaret, a supernumerary of the Cunard line, Unicorn and Sydenham.

A despatch has been received by the last steamer, ratifying the appointment of the Hon. Joseph Howe, to the office of Collector of Excise.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—The St. Patrick Society at St. John, has passed an unanimous Resolution of joy and satisfaction, on the restoration of the Hon. Thomas Baillie to the situation of Surveyor General.

All the City papers concur in the report, that there will be a new election: the time stated—about the latter end of next month. The Steamer Meteor, sunk near Fredericton, has been towed to St. John.
