Captain C. spoke the Watt, and the Master replied that his vessel was water-logged, with 10 feet of water in her hold, and he intended going on board a brig that was near. Captain C. offered to give any assistance in his power, which was declined. The Jane Lowden lay by the Watt all night, in the morning Captain C. went on board, and found only 3 feet of water in her hold, and after having the vessel pumped out, he sent his mate, with six of his crew, with instructions to carry the vessel to Cork.
