

procurement of a seat is so be a sine qua non with his continuance in office. You will therefore see that in the present position of affairs it would be both impolitic and premature to offer any opinion as to the procedure and position of the existing Cabinet, I may however say that they fully rely upon carrying a considerable majority with them. The Session it is not improbable may be a short one, in which case there will be another meeting shortly after Christmas.

I send you herewith a copy of Mr. Baldwin's amendment, and will, as I before said, send you the debates in full, by to-morrow's mail. The house during two days of this important discussion was crowded, to inconvenience, with visitors, many of them ladies; amongst the visitors of the harder sex was Mr. Grattan, H. B. Majesty's Consul at Boston. Lord Stopford arrived here to day. The weather has been extremely wet, with violent storms of thunder and lightning; last night there was a hoar frost, and to day the weather is clear and most agreeable.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE, Kingston, 13th Sept. 1842.

Sir,—Having taken into my most attentive and serious consideration the conversations that have taken place between us, I continue to feel the same desire to invite the population of French origin, in this Province, to afford their aid and sincere co-operation in my Government, for this reason I have not waited the result of your deliberations; but, on the contrary, I have considered how far it is possible for me to meet the views of those who possess the confidence of that portion of the population, in order to render their ascension to the government satisfactory to themselves, and at the same time to create that mutual confidence, which alone can render it advantageous to the country.

I have therefore, but not without difficulty, come to the conclusion, with this view, to the retirement of the Attorney General, Mr Ogden, from the office he at present holds; it being well understood that provision will be made for him, suitable to his long and faithful services.

This retirement enables me to offer you the situation of Attorney General for the Lower Province, with a seat in the Executive Council.

The office of Solicitor General of Lower Canada has long been kept open, in the hope of some arrangement being made that would promote the object which I have always had in view; and I should be most happy to lend an ear to any suggestion you may offer in naming a gentleman of British origin, whose co-operation in the government might assist us in the accomplishment of our common object.

I have carefully and seriously considered the desire you have expressed in giving your adhesion to government, to have the assistance of such sufficient support as might secure you the confidence of those whose interests you represent.

I have found that one of my plans for the advantage of Lower Canada may be made to agree with your views; that is to say the distribution of one part of the too dense population of your frontier settlements over a greater extent of country.

Mr Girouard has been mentioned to me as a gentleman possessing high talents for administration, and at the same time enjoying the confidence of his countrymen.

He may considerably promote my views in this respect; and I have therefore determined, if I should succeed in inducing you to accept my proposals, to offer him the situation now held by Mr Davidson, with a seat in the council, it being understood that this gentleman, (Mr Davidson) should be provided for in a manner suitable to his just claims, and that Mr Girouard finds some constituency to give him a seat in the Assembly.

I have further determined to offer the confidential office of Clerk of the Council to some gentleman of your recommendation, and I suggest that the reputation enjoyed by Mr Merin and Mr Parant, would indicate these gentlemen as amongst those most fitting for your recommendation.

The difference of Mr Baldwin with the government, having arisen principally from his desire of acting in concert with the Representatives of the French people, and this difference having been, as I hope, happily removed, I feel disposed to take advantage of his services.

Mr Draper has tendered the resignation of his office. I shall always regret the loss of the assistance he has at all times afforded me, and I shall feel under an imperious obligation to consider his

claims upon the government, on the first opportunity that may occur for their favorable consideration.

This will leave the office of Attorney General, West, with a seat in the council at my disposal; this I am ready to offer to Mr Baldwin.

The absence of Mr Sherwood deprives me of the opportunity of ascertaining how far he may be disposed to come into this arrangement, or of learning if he is ready to fulfil one of the conditions of his obligations, that of obtaining a seat in the Assembly. The disposition of his situation must therefore be left as a matter for future consideration.

Upon full knowledge of the sentiments entertained by all the gentlemen who constitute, at this time, my constitutional advisers, I see no reason to doubt, that a strong and united Council may be formed upon the basis of this proposition.

In this persuasion I have gone to the utmost extent to meet and satisfy your proposals, and if, after the overture, I find my efforts to secure the political tranquillity of the Province are unsuccessful, the satisfaction will at least remain that I have exhausted all those means, that the most ardent desire of accomplishing this great object has enabled me to imagine.
