James Tobin has commenced an action against a Mr Simms, a Stipendiary Magistrate, for interfering with him and forcibly, removing him from the Court House.

From Jamaica.—Accounts from Jamaica to the 29th November, inform us, that the Legislature, then in session, has determined to protect the interests of Great Britain and her Colonies, at the expense of the advanmight derive from an unrestricted importation of provisions and manufactures from the United States. The Legislature has the new Tariff, which is to take effect in April heat, under consideration. Every thing is quiet on the island, and American provisions are abnadant.

Jamaica papers to the 2d December have been received by an arrival at New York. Lieut, Wm. Hardy, nephew of Sir Thomas Hardy, died at Antigua on the 21 of October. Lieut. Steward and Assistant Surgeon Rewlby, of the 33d Regiment, died at St. Lucia, on the 9th of November.

The fever prevailing at Barbadoes, Trini-dad, and St. Lucia, and several cases bad terminated fatally. At Antigua there were at one time 47 cases on board the Tweed.

The troop ship Grocodile arrived at Kingston on the 27th Nov. from Grenada, with a detachment of the 1st West India Regiment Two cases of small pox appearing on boord, she was placed under quarantine.
