I accompanied the great and good Father Mathaw to Ardmore, near Youghall, on Sunday last, and saw him administer this pledge to 20,000 persons; and I am to accompany him on Sanday next to Carrigaholt, in the west of Ireland; near the mouth of the Shan-

non, in Clare; on a similar mission.

I thought it might interest some of your readers to know that there is no retrogade movement in Ireland.
