Montreal Courier, July 24 American Sympathy and Irish Repeal.—We beg to draw the attention of Irishmen in this city to the fellowing article, taken from the New York Journal of Confinerce. It offers what we believe to be a fair and honest explanation of the reasons which induced a number of usprincipled political speculators in the United States to take up the Repeal Question. There never was any sincere desire to benefit Ireland or Irishmen, but the subject was simply taken hold of as a means of creating political capital. So long as it asswered this purpose, well and good. Meetings were held, and Repeal went a head. But no sooner was it discovered that the movement threatened to interfere with American interests, than the Repeal thermometer instantly fell. From being at fever heat it went below zero, and has been gradually falling ever since. In the words of the Journal of Commerce, in their hearts these highly patriotic gentlemen cared no more for the Repeal of the Union between England and Ireland than they do for a Repeal of the Union between Nova Zembla and the North Pole. The conduct of their allies on this occasion, ought to be a lesson to Irishmen how they put trust in American sympathy, for the future.

FRIGHTFUL OUTRAGE IN PHILADELPHIA.—
—Desperate Conduct —The Philadelphia Gazette of Tuesday evening says—Last night about 9 o'clock, a large meb of men came into the vicinity of Sixth and Shippen street, as is supposed, to attack the members and apparatus of the New Adaption 11.65. of the Hope engine company. Alderman Hoffner, being near the spot, attempted to quiet and disperse them, when he was attacked, knocked disperse them, when he was attacked, knocked down, and beaten in a most outrageous manner. His head is severely bruised, and his nose broken and disfigured. Officers George Hoffner, constable Dentry, and others, interfered, but they were repulsed, and narrowly escaped serious injury. The origin of the melec was a pitched fight between a member of the Hope engine company and a member of the Hibernia engine company, in which conflict the Hibernia member came off wersted. The Hibernia party in consequence of this result, proceeded to be revenged by an attack, as stated. Warrants have been taken out for some of the rioters.

Fire at Copenhagen.—The great fire on June 20th, was as extensive as that caused by the bombardment of the British in 1807. It commenced at 0 o'clock in the evening in one of the immense store houses of Jacques Holm & Son, and burned several buildings adjacent. The fire was mastered by ten o'clock in the morning of the 21st, although still burning in the ruins. the ruins.
