In tacking butter for the matket, it is essential that the firkin should be made of ash or oak, which should be quite white; it should be washed inside with a strong hot brine before being used, and rubbed with salt; a thin layer of salt being strewed on the bottom, the butter being dry is pressed tightly in with a wooden rammer; if there be not enough to fill the firkin at once, the surface having been made smooth, some salt is scattered over it, and a cloth press-ed close down so as to exclude the air; when fresh is added, the salt which had been scattered on the surface is carefully removed with a spoon, the surface is rendered rough by diggtng with a little wooden spade, by which a seam at the joining is prevented. When the firkin is filled, a little salt is spread on the surface, and the lid closed down.
