We take the following from the St. Stephen's Courant:

"In consequence of the continued rains during the past week, and sudden melting of the snow, the Scodiac river has risen to an unprecedented height.

"The lower Toll Bridge between the two villages of Mill Town (St. Stephen and Calais) was carried away on Wednesday last, and on Friday the Boom on the American side of the Union Mills, gave way with a tremendous crash. We have seldom witnessed a more animating scene than was presented on Friday afternoon in the Cove, by the activity and daring of the persons engaged in securing the lumber During the evening of Friday, the river continued to rise, and the toll house, and one or two other houses were swept away; and durtwo other houses were swept away; and dur-ing the evening of Saturday, the inmates of those houses which are situated on the banks of the river, found it necessary to remove from them. One or two of the mills were slightly started. But it is likely no further damage will occur (unless we have rain) as the river has fallen since Saturday, upwards of six inches."
