

13th.—That every Deputy authorized to perform the foregoing duties will be required to give a Bond to the Queen, with two approved securities, in the penal sum of £400, conditional for the faithful performance of his duty.

14th.—That no Deputy shall be permitted, either directly or indirectly, during the continuance of his official employment, to purchase or be in any manner interested in any Crown Lands whatsoever.

15th.—That where large parties of Settlers may associate and make application for the purchase of Tracts of Wilderness Lands, in situations distant from any settlements already formed or in progress, and to which communications may not have been opened through the Forest, they will set forth in their Petitions, and the Surveyors in their Reports, all such particulars; and when the difficulties to be overcome may require greater facilities than are provided for in the foregoing Regulations, the case will be referred for the special consideration of the Lieutenant Governor and Council; and when such parties may engage to defray the charges of surveying their Locations, and also of the Bye Laws required to be opened to and through their Settlement, and to which they are willing to apply their own labour, the Deputy Surveyors will be authorized to execute such surveys. In laying out such Locations, the Surveyors are to attend to the 6th clause of the Regulations of the second of December last, in reserving Lines of Road, and allotments for Schools and places of Worship, which Reserves will not be allowed to be broken or sold.

IMMIGRATION SOCIETY. At a Special Meeting of the Immigration Society, held at Hamill's Hotel, Newcastle, 23rd May, 1843, pursuant to Requisition: present—Alex. Rankin, Esq., in the chair, James Souter, John Fraser, Reverend Alex. Rankin, Alex. Goodfellow, Reverend James Souter, John Fraser, John Williston, George Kerr, and E. Williston. The Requisition having been read,—On motion of George Kerr, Esq., and seconded by Alex. Rankin, Esq., the following Resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, that the Reverend James Souter intends to visit Great Britain and the Old Country to promote Immigration to this Colony; and whereas Mr. Souter is well acquainted with the climate, soil, productions and capabilities of New Brunswick; and whereas it is desirable that this Society should avail itself of the present favorable opportunity of affording correct information to the British public upon a subject so vitally connected with the prosperity of this colony—Resolved, that the Board have full confidence in Mr. Souter, and that he will give a fair representation of the colony; and further Resolved,—that this Board are desirous of co-operating with Mr. Souter in this important measure, and are ready to afford any information or assistance in their power to such industrious Emigrants as may be desirous to resort to this portion of the Province; and an extract of this Resolution, signed by the President and Recording Secretaries, be tendered to enable Mr. Souter to be enabled to carry out the objects of the foregoing resolution to the sum of £50 from the funds of this Society be placed at his disposal.

Resolved,—that the foregoing proceedings be published in the Gleaner newspaper. E. WILLISTON, Recording Secretary.

City of St. John.—The New Brunswick article of Monday last, concludes a paper on the monetary affairs of the County, as follows:

The auditing committee were directed to apply to the County Treasurer forthwith for his accounts, and another special sessions were ordered to be held on the 5th June next, in order that the county accounts might be received and audited, prior to the meeting of the General Assembly.

The lateness of the hour at which we received this report, prevents our animadverting upon it—suffice it to say, that the county owes to the people, that John R. Partelow, the County Treasurer, has no accounts forthcoming!—that the County has been abstracted from the county without authority!—and that nobody knows how it has been done! "Great Country this!"

United States.—It will be seen by the following paragraphs copied from the late New York paper, that an affair

has lately taken place in Mobile, which may lead to some difficulty. We know from experience that Brother Jonathan would make out of it a most admirable case for an indemnity, had one of the United States functionaries received similar treatment at the hands of the British.

"The following statement is of serious import, and if its accuracy is to be depended on, the Mobile functionaries have managed probably to get us into difficulty that may be exceedingly awkward and embarrassing.

"Colonel Fitzgerald, the British Consul, was brought before the Mayor of that city on the 13th, charged with using abusive and insulting language to Thomas Stringer, a Justice of the Peace. He was fined \$20, which several citizens very properly insisted on paying out of their own pockets. He was arrested on a warrant from the Justice and thrust into prison—protesting at the same time that his official character ought to protect him. The Mobile Herald says he was put into a cell with common felons, and otherwise abused. Bail was offered but he declined it."

Salmon.—A number of Salmon have been in market during the last two or three days.

WEST INDIES.—It appears that frequent shocks of Earthquakes continued to be felt at Nevis, St. Lucia, and the adjoining Islands, and a very severe shock on the 14th ult. at Antigua, which caused much apprehension. The Island of Saint Vincent was suffering from drought, the canes were burning, and the young plants dying."

Mr. Pierce, Sir—Can you assign a reason why the committee appointed by the Sessions to arrange and publish the County Accounts, have not attended to that duty?
