WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of this Province, made and passed in the thirty ninth year of the reign of King George the Third, It is among other things enacted, that in the bay and river of Miramichi and its branches, no Nett whatever shall be set off any part of Fox Island, Portage Island, or any other island, middle ground or shoal, in the said bay or river and branches of the Miramichi, except as is therein excepted; and further that no Nett shall at any time be set, or remain in the water, or Seine be drawn, or any Salmon speared, in any part of the said bay and river and its branches, between sun-set on Saturday night, and sun-rise on Monday morning, under the penalty of having the said Netts seized, forfeited, and sold, for any breach of any of the provisions of the said in part recited act. AND WHEREAS it is believed that the Fisheries in the bay, river, and branches of the Miramichi, have hitherto been much injured from repeated violations of the said Law, and especially from Netts being set off from, or at Fox Island, Portage Island, and other places in the bay and river of Mira-michi, from which by Law Netts are prohibited from being set.
