European News.

From British Papers to the 4th July, received by the Caledonia Steamer.

World's Convention.—The Anti Slavery delegates from all parts of the world assembled on Tuesday, June 13th, at the Freemason's Tavern, Great Queen Street, London, to take measures for the abolition of slavery and the slave trade—Between three and four hundred delegates were present, and amongst them deputations from the United States of America, Canada, Ireland, and Scotland, and various towns and anti-slavery associations in England and Wales. On the motion of W. T. Blair, seconded by the Rev. Dr. Raffles, Samuel Gurney, Esq., was unanimously called to the chair, Thomas Clarkson, the President announced, being unavoidably absent from indisposition. The meetings were continued on Wednesday and Thursday.

Death of Mr. Murray, the Publisher.—Mr. Murray, the eminent publisher, died on Tuesday morning in Albemarle-street. He had for some time past, been poorly; but his indisposition did not assume an alarming character until Friday last.—In private life Mr. Murray was beloved by all who knew him; and in kindness of heart, warmth of hospitality, and sincerity of friendship, has left few equals. As a publisher, his name is associated with those of all the most eminent men who have adorned the literature of the present century. Mr. Murray was in his 64th year; and had been in business as a publisher, first in the Strand, and afterwards in Albemarle-street, for upwards of forty years.

Lord Aberdeen's Bill.—This measure is brought forward too late to prevent the secession in the church; and it would have been ineffectual for that purpose, even had it been offered earlier. It is, in fact, a piece of superfluous legislation, "to remove doubts respecting the admission of ministers to benefices in the Church of Scotland," for the satisfaction, we presume, of those who adhere to the establishment, and who entertain no doubts on the subject. The measure was read a second time in the House of Lords, but was stoutly opposed by the principal law lords, as giving a degree of power to the Church Courts beyond what they ever possessed.—Glasgow Citizen.

INDIA.

Scinde.—Shere Mahomed's present post is a place called Sukkurind, described as being on the Indus, about fifty miles above Hyderabad. One writer estimates his force at from thirty to forty thousand men, with 20 guns, but this is deemed rather an exaggerated view.

The Punjab.—The Maharajah Shere Singh, who has lately been out on a pilgrimage to the celebrated fortress of Khote Kungra, has been attacked with palsy, and is still, it would appear, in considerable danger. Should the stroke prove fatal, disturbances of a serious nature are anticipated; and it is supposed that a sufficient pretext would soon be found for our interference, which, it cannot be doubted, would ere long result in the annexation of the country to our possessions.

Afghanistan.—Akbar Khan is still at Jellalabad, at the head of a considerable force. He is negotiating with the Hill Tribes of the Khybur, for the passage of his father, Dost Mahomed [who has arrived at Peshawar], through the defile, but has not as yet been successful, the chiefs asking no less than three lacks of rupees [or £30,000] for his safe transit. They appear to appreciate the consequence of the traveller.

Khytul.—We are now in secure possession of this state, the insurgents having dispersed into the jungles, without any chance of again making head against us.

Boondelkhund.—This country is still in a disturbed state, though latterly, to all appearances, somewhat quieter than before.

Upper Assam.—The marauders who attacked our posts on the frontier of Upper Assam some time ago, have been captured or dispersed; the country is quiet, and the troops are returning.

RIOTS IN WALES.—Rebecca and her Daughters.—The district of South Wales, the inhabitants of which were at one time proverbial for their peaceful habits, has been distinguished by the occurrence, within its locality, of one of the most systematic insurrections which of late years an agricultural district has known. A mob, well organized, and apparently carefully drilled, headed by a stalwart figure dressed in woman's clothing, has latterly been perpetrating serious outrages upon the turnpike gates and the keepers of them. At length they determined upon a demonstration of their force, which should awe, as indeed it did, the inhabitants of the principality.—The town of Carmarthen was the site selected for this display. The appearance of the rioters was announced to occur on Sunday, the 18th; however, in consequence of some unexplained reason it was deferred to the following day.
