

of the dispute with China, which reached Manchester on Monday, caused considerable excitement in the market, and though no great amount of business was done, higher prices were obtained for most kinds of manufactured goods, and for some kinds of yarn suitable for the eastern markets. NEW BRUNSWICK. The Election. On Monday morning at the Court House of this City, the poll for the County was opened. The morning was stormy and the snow fell fast, which made it anything but pleasant for such an occasion. The Court House was crowded at an early hour almost to suffocation and a dense crowd unable to enter surrounded the door. The Deputy Sheriff appeared at the door of the Court House for the purpose of opening the Poll, but such was the pressure that it was all but impossible to effect his purpose. He was several times interrupted and obliged to desist, and it was not until the mob had satisfied their propensity for snow balling and yelling that he could finish his business. On such an occasion we were prepared to expect something like order, something like arrangement and preparation, but there it was as usual, all confusion and no arrangement. The Court House literally crammed the outside as to threaten lives of those who unfortunately got hemmed in by the surrounded mob. It is much to be lamented that Public officers, take so little pains to perform the duties of their offices. The whole business appeared to us a scene of confusion, some of the candidates were for speaking in the Court Room up stairs, others to address the people outside from the window, at length it was determined to take the window for it. The Candidates then took the Council Chamber, the only empty space in the house, and from there addressed the people, but such was the dissatisfaction of the crowd, that with the exception of a lull at intervals little or nothing could be heard. The speeches made, they commenced polling when at the close at 5 o'clock for the county, J. R. Partlow, Esq. was the leading Candidate. For the City R. L. Hazen, Esq. With the exception of the scene at the Court House the whole day was spent as a holiday. Sleighs with the colours of the different Candidates were in full play, and dashed through the Streets in true Election style. Harmony of all parties appearing to be the order of the day. We sincerely hope for the credit of the city that the same good feeling will mark the whole duration of the Election and that the beaten parties will have philosophy sufficient to keep their tempers, and blame no man who has voted contrary to their wish, as it is the exercise only of an undoubted privilege which should pass unchallenged by any one.
