The plan suggested of compelling every resident Freeholder to poll in his own district, and requiring all votes to be polled in one day, is an admirable one; but we would propose in our opinion—a decided improvement-that the Ballot be adopted instead of the old system. We feel convinced, until this method be adopted, the free expression of public sentiment will never be obtained at Elec-

Respectably Sheweth, That your Petitioners being duly impressed with the importance of a proper exercise of the Elective Franchise, and of the Law of the Land affording every facility. facility for the attainment of an object so desirable, beg to represent that the present system of holding Elections is liable to gross abuse, and tends in a Rreat measure to destroy the true design of this constitutional right.

That the assembling at the Poll of large bodies of people, sometimes amounting to several thousands, among whom great diversity of opinion generally exists, is highly calculated to excte, foster, and except a several thousands. foster, and encourage party spirit, and the close contact into which opposing harties are thus brought, frequently induces a resort to the most immoral and violent means for the purpose of securing the return of such Condidate as each may consider the most suitable.

That the continuance of the Polling at Electious for a number of consecutive days and the excitement consequent thereon, almost invariably produces the most bitter and rancorous feeling, which, increasing as the contest approaches to a close, is often exhibited in ricious proceedings and acts of violence.

That in the opinion of Your Petition ers the only means by which these evils, together with others consequent upon present Election system can be remedied, are, an enactment by the Legis-lature, dividing the several Counties of the Province into Districts -directing the Pols to be held simultaneously in each Counties of the Regiseach County, providing for the Registration of persons qualified to vote,—
tequiring all votes to be polled one day compelling every resident Freeholder vote in his own District—attaching the Poll armed with offensive weapons and empowering the Returning Officers to appoint Special Constables and adopt anch other means as will be necessary for the preservation of order and the securing free admission to the Po'l.

Coroner's Inquest.—An Inquest has held on Thursday last, at the residence in the dence of Mr John Decantlin, in the Darish of Mr John Decampy, Martin Channel of Blissfield, before Martin Crannay, Esq. Coroner, on view of

returned the verdict that the deceased came to her death by having a pot of burning charcoal placed in her room.

This inquiry was instituted by direction of a number of the Magistrates, in consequence of very grave and serious charges having been made against certain persons, which caused considerable excitement in the parish in which the deceased lived. After a very minute investigation, nothing was elicited to throw the least suspicion or blame on any one. The body was raised after being interred a fortnight, and appeared as if it had been laid in the grave a day or two, so trifling was the change in its appearance.

The Jury examined the body very minutely, and could not observe any marks of violence thereon (notwithstanding the reports to the contrary;) and Dr. Key, who accompanied the Coroner, with great risk to himself and horse, the ice on the river being in a dangerous state, on viewing the body externally, and after the post mortem examination, could not come to any other conclusion than that she came to her death by suffocation, by charcoal being impudently placed in her room on the night of her death.

An inquest was held on the body by two Magistrates, a short time after the melancholy occurrence; but as there was no Medical gentleman present, these unfounded reports got into circulation.

The Legislature .-- Our Legislature met for the despatch of business on Tuesday last. By the mail we obtained the Speech of His Excellency on opening the session; and by a private conveyance we received the Journal of the first day's proceedings. John W. Weldon, Esq. was appointed Speaker. He was proposed by Mr Partelow, whose proposition was seconded by Wm. End, Esq. Both gentlemen spoke in high terms of the conservative principles of the learned gentleman-of his intimate knowledge of the constitution and parliamentary usages-of his firmness upon every occasion where the constitutional rights of the people of the Province required his support, and of his abilities, which admirably qualified him to hold the proud position of the first Commoner in the Province. We do not think the House could have made a better choice. Mr Hill proposed L. A. Wilmot, Esq. but that gentleman declined the honor of being put in nomination.
