To the Electors of the County of Northumberland. GENTLEMEN, The Address of a number of Freeholders soliciting me again to offer myself as a Candidate at the approaching Election, and my answer published; I deem it scarcely necessary to put forth an address in this form, apprising you of my intention, and should not have done so, was it not for the improper and unjustifiable canvass from the Hustings at the opening of the Poll, I stated that Mr. Rankin was then using his influence to carry Mr. Street in with himself; Rankin persisted in denying it, until it became too plain to be longer concealed. He actually solicited voters at the hustings to vote for Mr. Street after they had voted for himself. He is now canvassing the county, and my principal object in addressing you, is to urge upon you, not to allow your minds to be prejudiced against me by the improper epithets made use of towards myself personally, and against my supporters, by that gentleman. I was fully aware that I should have all the weight and influence of the concern of Gilmour Rankin & Co. against me at the approaching contest; but I did not expect that Mr. Rankin would so far forget himself as to travel the county, and personally solicit the Freeholders to give Mr. Street a vote after having recently bestowed their suffrages on himself. Surely there must be something more than personal friendship, to induce him to do this; there must be some great private interest at stake. All cannot be from pure, and disinterested friendship; if it is, and Mr. Street should succeed, he will owe his friend and supporter a debt of gratitude so trammel him in the Assembly as to destroy his independence and usefulness. Gentlemen, I shall be at my post on the opening of the Poll on the 17th, to receive your suffrages, when I shall be able to refute every slander that has been circulated against me, and when I shall be able to address you more at length than I can do at present. I throw myself on the independent constituency of Northumberland. I rest not on the support of any one man, or one concern, but on the support of the People, who I am ready to serve—it is their cause that is now to be tried, and if lost, the loss will be theirs, not mine. NOTICE. Steamer St. George. The Directors of the Prince Edward Island Steam Navigation Company, having received a Communication from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, enclosing the legal opinion of the Attorney and Solicitor Generals of that Province, to the intent that the Company has neither a legal or an equitable claim to any support from the Government of New Brunswick for the services performed by the Steamer St. George, have very reluctantly determined to withdraw her from the Miramichi voyage, until the Grant of the Legislature of New Brunswick is assured to the Company.
