But besides availing themselves of the graine and hard toil of othe themselves of the g-nus and hard toil of oth-ers, without making them any return, the cost of printing and paper in these countries is nearly one half less than in England.

"Oa the other hand, the pirated editions, owing to the hurried manner in which they are got up (being generally printed within twenty four hours of the receipt of the English edition), and in order to save the (in England necessary) expense of common revision, are fall of the grossest blunders, which must often interfere with the correct understanding of the work.
