board (except four) were lost. There were twenty-two persons on board, and amongst those who perished were all the officers of the ship. Of those saved, one jumped to the shore from the jib-boom when the barque first struck; the others were drifted ashore on a part of the deck. So violent was the storm that all the masts went by the board in a few moments after she struck, and the hull was not long in going to pieces. Those who have been there says that a more perfect wreck was never seen, pieces of the vessel being strewed all along the shore.

A good deal of doubt exists as to the cause of the disaster. It appears from the statements of the crew, that she made Brier Island on Saturday and that the Captain then kept the vessel off and on until Monday afternoon, when the men becoming dissatisfied, went to the Capt. in a body and demanded of him what he intended to do with the ship, and requesting with that coolness for which seamen are so remarkable, not that he would not run her ashore, but that if he did so, he would do it in the day-time and give them a chance for their lives. The Captain seems, from their statement, not to have taken much notice of this, other than to tell them that he would bring them safely to St. John. From the log-slate, however, it appears that this appeal must have been more violent than the sailors represent, as it is recorded that they threatened to take the command of the ship from the Captain.—On Tuesday afternoon, they made what must have been Mount Desert Rock, though they did not know it, and in the evening they found themselves among breakers, and attempted to wear the ship, but failed, and went ashore.—After attempting without success to save themselves in the yawl-boat, which was dashed in pieces as soon as it struck the water, all the sailors, except the four saved, clung together near the bow, and by one wave were swept away.—The Captain was swept away from the quarter deck, and the mate did not come out of the cabin. If the disaster was, as there seems to be too much reason to believe, caused by the intoxication of the Captain, it ought to be known as a warning.

The names of the persons saved, as given by themselves, are, George Williamson, steward, William Moore, Francis Williams, and Frederick Smith, seamen.

HEALTH OF OUR RURAL DISTRICTS.—We understand that there has been, and still is, much sickness in the settlements around us. There has been a number of deaths, but as we have not been furnished with a list of the names of the parties, we cannot record them. No charge is made for the insertion of deaths. We make this known, as we are led to suppose, from the circumstance of so few notifications of the demise of individuals being furnished us, that an opinion to the contrary prevails.

UNITED STATES.—Thirty thousand barrels of Flour were received at Albany on the 20th and 21st ult.

It is stated that over 60,000 tons of anthracite coal will be consumed in the iron works of Pennsylvania, during the present year.

IRELAND.—A late number of the Cork Examiner, thus speaks of the mineral wealth of Ireland:—

"It is not only in its agriculture that Ireland is susceptible of great improvement; almost every county abounds in mineral wealth; iron, copper, lead, silver tin, antimony, and gold are found in various districts; the three former are rich ores, capable of being easily worked. Sulphur, cobalt, tale, ochres, gypsum, fuller's earth, marble, porphyry, granite, slate and lime are abundant. The minor productions of the counties through which the railway [Dublin and Cork] would pass, have been thus specified; Cork—coal, iron, copper, lead, ochres, and potter's clay. Tipperary—coal, iron, copper, lead, silver, tin, slate, and marble. Waterford—copper, iron, green marble. Limerick—coal, iron, copper, lead, and slate. Kerry—lead, copper, cobalt, and marble. Kilkenny—coal, iron, jasper, marble, pipe clay and granite. Queen's county—coal, iron, copper, and marble. Carlow—tale, marble, ochres and granite. Wexford—coal and lead. Wicklow—gold, copper, iron, tin, lead, and sulphur."

BERMUDA.—Late intelligence from these islands state that the Fever was rapidly disappearing.

THE SEASON.—The river is now fast bound in icy fetters. Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, were very cold days, and on the last named day, several individuals skated from Newcastle to Chatham on the river. Since then, horses and sleighs have crossed over. The river is thronged throughout the day and evening with skaters, who, it appears, have determined not to lose a moment of the time which the absence of snow will allow them, to indulge in this healthful exercise. Our streets are quite bare of snow.

RIOTS IN PHILADELPHIA.—The New York Tribune, makes the following judicious remarks on the recent fights in Philadelphia, between the Firemen of that city:—

"We wonder what our Philadelphia friends can be about to permit the disgraceful fight between its firemen, of which every mail brings us reports. The City of Brotherly Love is acquiring a very unenviable notoriety, and its police, we think, must be the worst in the world. A fire that shall one of these days spread devastation through the city, while its brutal firemen are busy knocking each others brains out, will bring the citizens to their senses. Especially is there no excuse for such desecrations of the Sabbath, sending alarm and tumult among the quiet and moral portions of the community. These evils can be checked at the outset as easily as when they have brought contempt on the authorities and suffering on the people."
