

There was a tolerably large attendance, about 2,500 people, nearly one half of whom were women. Shortly after one o'clock Mr O'Connell made his appearance in the gallery, immediately beneath his own portrait, accompanied by some ladies, whom he led to front seats directly over the chair. The hon. gentlemen, (who wore a green velvet cap of quaint device, embroidered with gold, and having a tassel of the same material,) looked better than he has appeared for some weeks back.

Sums of money were delivered in from various quarters and Mr O'Connell spoke at some length, but his address was not of any great interest, nor did it exhibit any features of novelty, a large portion of it being occupied by observations on arguments that have recently been put forth in *The Times*.

A great quantity of minor business was transacted, and the meeting did not terminate till six o'clock, at which hour the rent was announced to be £636 8s.

Mr O'Connell announced that he would take the chair at the Limerick banquet to Mr W. S. O'Brien, M. P., this day.

The arbitration courts are daily increasing in the confidence of the people; who crowd to them wherever they are established, instead of the petty session courts, which have been almost totally deserted.

IRELAND:

Funeral of the late T. Waller, Esq.—Yesterday (Friday), at half past one o'clock in the afternoon, the funeral of Mr. Waller, the second victim of the barbarous onslaught at Finoo, took place. The house and approach to it were crowded with the gentry of the neighbourhood, anxious to testify their respect for the memory of the deceased, and their deep horror at the murder. A deep silence reigned among them as they fell in with the procession, for the coffin was borne to the grave by persons of the higher class exclusively. It was preceded by a very large number of the clergy from the neighbouring district. It was most awful to witness the still blood-sprinkled state of the rooms and hall of the dwelling house—especially the curtains of the latter, which was the chief scene of the deadly struggle, and which may literally have been said to be double-dyed with crimson. The service was read by the parochial clergyman, the Rev. Mr. Gould, and the Rev. Mr. Cotter preached the funeral address.

We understand that the butler walked out for a few moments on Friday, but was still very weak.—*Nenagh Guardian*.

Warlike Preparations.—The Penelope steam-frigate has arrived in Kingstown harbour, loaded almost to the water's edge with large gunboats. They are intended for the Upper Shannon, and the large lakes formed by that river in its progress towards the lower branch. A considerable number of persons were collected on the banks of the canal this morning, to witness their being towed to Portobello from the basin at Ringsend. They are immense boats, with great beam, capable of carrying two guns, and accommodating a large body of men. They are double-banked, and each pulled by twelve rowers. As floating batteries, they are most formidable, and furnish an important as well as a novel addition to the armament already existing in this country.

The gun-battery of the Royal Horse-Artillery and Royal Artillery in Limerick is augmented to six pieces of ordnance, including a howitzer, beside gun mortars in the Castle and new barracks.

Signal Fires.—The Marquis of Downshire has addressed a letter to his tenants on his Edenderry estate, cautioning them against making, or permitting to be made, signal fires on their farms, and in case of their acting contrary to his advice, that he would consider them disloyal subjects, and dangerous persons, and therefore unfit to reside on his property.

Alleged Murder.—A correspondent of the *Mail* of last night, in a postscript to a letter referring to the Finoo tragedy, says—"A tenant of Lord Dunally's, report says, was shot last night. I believe it is too true."

The murderous assault upon Mr. Waller's family, in Tipperary, of which we gave the particulars in our last, has, besides the death of Miss Vereker, eventuated in the death of that gentleman, and the tragedy is likely to be consummated by the death of Mrs. Waller, who is not expected to survive long.

Government have offered an increased reward of One Hundred and Fifty Pounds for the apprehension of the men who attacked Mr. Waller's house; and Mr. Brerford, a magistrate, has offered Five Hundred Pounds for their conviction, and One Hundred Pounds for private information of each person concerned.
