Wigance is contained in a communication, dated Kingston, [Canada] October 22:

"The Agent of the St. Regis Indians informs me, that he received a message from St. Regis on Saturday night, informing him that the American Indians in 'the American village' had declared that the whole village of St. Regis was ceded to the United States by the Ashburton Treaty, and, set on by certain designing men, they had gone on staking out and leasing the lands to white men. The British Indians, in their perplexity, were at a loss to determine what course to take, and sent to the agent for directions. The agent, acting on the advice of Sir Charles Metcalfe, directed the British Indians to use whatever force was necessary to drive the intruders from their part of the village; to arrest all engaged in this business and send them Montreal gaol, and if they are not strong enough of themselves, the aid of Her Majesty's troops will be promptly furnished them. So that 'there is now a fine chance for more disturbances on the frontier,' and a glorious opportunity for some fine paragraphs. If any thing like a fracas should occur, as is probable, I will hear of it by the next boat, and will go down there immediately. The whole business is, undoubtedly, the getting up of some designing white men who are prowling about that peaceful Indian village, and who think they will be the gainers by getting up a disturbance. 'Collins and Valentine's line,' which is the boundary according to the Ashburton Treaty, is distinctly marked through the village, and is the line that always separated the tribe—the British and American Indians."

Bathurst News.—We are indebted to the New Brunswick of Tuesday last, for the following additional items of British news.

The Times fears more real danger and difficulty from the Scotch disturbance, than from either of the others. And with reason, for the spirit of the Covenanters is roused in that remote people, and history tells us that they fear neither danger nor death for the sake of their religion.

Some violence have already taken place in Scotland, caused by State Ministers being invited into churches which the ministers of the Free Church had conscientiously abandoned rather than become Erastians.

The convulsion in the church still proceeds. The Bishop of Rochester has published a prophetic charge, and the congregations in many places have resolved at public meetings to quit the churches whenever one of the Tractarian doctrines is preached or a rite practised. The Anti State Church Convention Scheme seems to be taken up with spirit by a section of the Tractarians.

The Rev. Mr Newman has given his friends to understand that he believes his diocesan, notice that he relinquished connexion with periodical contributions. Mr Newman was induced to resign his living by the removal of the Lord Bishop of Oxford against the Ultra Puseyite doctrines promulgated by the leading Tractarian in the pulpit of Saint Mary's.

## Mail by the St. George.

The St. George arrived this morning at 11 o'clock. We make a few extracts from the papers which have been received by her.

The Halifax papers are full of electioneering matters. At the adjourned meeting of the Freeholders of Halifax county, held on Monday last, Messrs. Howe, Annand, Stairs, and M'Nab, were unanimously re-nominated. There is a rumor that they will be opposed.

A journeyman Painter, residing in Halifax, named Dominic Von Malder, received information by the last British steamer, that a relative, recently deceased, has left him £17,000.

## Halifax Post.

Canal and Territorial Revenue.—It is said that the late dissolution of the Assembly arose out of a deficiency in the Revenues—the proceeds not being anything like sufficient to pay the official salaries.

P. E. ISLAND.—The inhabitants of this Island are suffering very severely from Influenza, Cough, Hooping Cough. The Colonial Herald, speaking of the weather, says:—

"The greater part of the potatoes to the westward are nearly lost—rotting in the ground. The grain and hay stacks are also, in many places, wet to the bottom. Dreadful losses will be sustained throughout the country. In many places Mill Dams and Bridges are entirely carried away with the freshets. In the neighbourhood of Cascumpec, the rivers and bays were so full of water, that one could scarcely see a foot of the usually clear water; in many parts, the lands are completely flooded."

LUNCH.—At Bathurst, on Monday last, from the ship yard of Messrs. Canards, the barque *Larch*, of the burthen of 444 tons.

Highway Robbery.—We have been credibly informed—and we wish to call the attention of the proper authorities, more particularly, to the fact—that a number of robberies, and other depredations, from time to time, been perpetrated at or near Tea Hill, Lot 40, and within four or five miles of Charlottetown, by some persons who have hitherto contrived to escape detection. Persons of both sexes have been beaten and forcibly deprived of their property.
