FREE TRADE.

Elections are destined henceforth to assume an entirely new aspect and character. The public mind, moving onwards to one grand object, passes over mere party distinctions, personal claims, and local animosities. It is ready still for "boot and saddle," but not at the call of any temporary expediency of the hour. Rising out of the ruins of political fraud and party schemes, may be seen a new element, linking together individuals hitherto utterly divergent in their political feelings. Intelligent Conservatives are no longer kept in awe by the vulgar fears of "letting in the Whigs." Society Radicals no longer expect more from a Peel than a Melbourne administration. The delusion is utterly gone; and instead of wasting time in unavailing regrets, the mass of the electoral community are preparing to atone for the great error of 1841, by seeking objects higher, better and nobler, than the miserable notion of turning out the Ministry, or upholding another.

The great bond of union is free trade, and that is now sought with an earnestness commensurate with its greatness. It is fitting that in this new movement London should take the lead. Free trade is the harbinger of so much that is vast and important, that we verily believe the detection of the metropolis would be stamped on the age, as one of its most serious and enormous crimes. Without London, free trade will be carried; with it carried in the most appropriate and triumphant way. Next Saturday, will, therefore, be a day, literally, truly, and without exaggerated phrase, big with the fate of England. On that day will rest the decision whether or no the triumph of free trade will be immediate, or the result of a protracted struggle. On that day may depend the fact of the successful reiteration or permanent closing of markets still open upon our commerce, our industry, and our skill. On that day may depend the question whether free trade may come in time or come too late.

Much, therefore, rests with the citizens of London. We should be sorry to see the election carried by some mere measuring cast majority. Free trade, in the election of Mr. Pease, should have its triumphant hundreds; the voice spoken from London to the Provinces, should be a voice of power. Apathy, negligence, indifference, in an elector, would constitute a positive offence in the sight of God and man. He who permits the fate of an administration to kick the beam, when the fate of an empire and of millions are in the opposite balance, is, indeed a driver of the worst description.

THE REVENUE OF THE LAST SEVEN YEARS. It must be most gratifying to the public to observe that the further progress of that deficiency of revenue which had uninterruptedly prevailed for so many years, and which had been justly a cause of serious anxiety, has, by the exertion of government and the energy of parliament been effectually arrested; and that the quarter's account presents a favorable contrast with that of the six preceding years, inasmuch as, instead of a deficiency, it shows a surplus of revenue above expenditure to the extent of £2,908,000. To those who are not in the habit of preserving or comparing financial statements it may be satisfactory to be furnished with the accounts for the last seven years, and we therefore subjoin a statement of them:—

This statement requires no comment whatever. We would only remark, with respect to the account of the last year, that the revenue side of it has been unduly swelled by the receipt of a large sum (viz. 1,315,209l.) from China; but, on looking to the other side of the account, it will appear that a yet larger amount (viz., 1,615,507l.) has been paid within the year under the heads of opium compensation or China expenditure, the greater part of which will not again recur. We do not found, upon this great improvement of our financial state, any exaggerated expectation for the future. The surplus, which the account now presents, may vary in amount at different periods of the year, but we do confess that we hail with unmixed satisfaction this decided indication of a return to a sounder financial policy.
