a large body of Canallers came in from Lachine (Drummondites) and commenced a terrible row in McGill street, when the riot act was tead, and Colonel Gugy ordered the detach ment of the 33d to charge, which they did, effectually, wounding three or four, and some thirty or forty were captured and sent to gacl; much property has been destroyed, but it is impossible for me to give you the particulars.

Business was quite at a stand, not a shop open. I went to the Camp de Mars last evening, after the polls were closed, to hear the speeches of the returned candidates; but such was the cheering that nothing could be heard. Four companies of troops were stationed in different parts of the Camp to preserve order. The troops in garrison were so much fangued from being up night and day, marching and countermarching in every part of the town, that it was found necessary to call in a relief; consequently, about 3 o'clock in the affernoon of yesterday, the Prince Albert, from Laprairie, breught in large D tachments of the 52nd and 71st, regimeats.

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"Now my dear friend I will candidly tell you, there will never be peace in this ill-fated city: parties are very high, and much ill blood existing among them all."

## TIMBER TRADE.

Liverpool, October 19.—The supply of Pine Timber since our last, has been extremely large, and the quays are becoming exceedingly crowdad. Quebec cargoes have been sold at 27½d, 17¾d, and 18d per foot; and Saint John cargoes of large average, which previously seld at 20½d, to 21¼d, per foot. Should the importers press their cargoes on the market, it is evident prices must droop, but should they determine on yarding, this would have a tendency materially to steady the market Birch continues to be in great request, entire parcels have been sold at 20.1 per foot; a lot of Saint John was sold at auction last week, and brought 21d per foot. Two parcels of Yellow Quebec Deals were sold at auction this week at £8 15s to £8 17s.6d per standard hundred. The arrivals of Pine and Spruce Planks have been very extensive, and prices have mostly ruled about 2½d per foot of two inches:

LAUNCHES .- From the building yards of Messrs. J. Cunard & Co., at Kouchibouguac, on Wednesday the 30th ult., the brig "Stag," of the burthen of 159 tons old measurement. This vessel is said to be built almost exclusively of Larch-intended for the Newfoundland trade; and is reported as to model and workmanship, as a very superior vessel. At Chatham, on Thursday last, a beautiful bark, called the "Sword-fish," of the burthen of 452 tons old, 340 tons, new measurement. This vessel is said to have been constructed principally with reference to her intended employment as a Packet Ship in the Brazil trade, out of Liverpool -is built entirely of Larch, and for beauty of model, and style of workmanship, we have seldom seen her equal.

The Launch of this vessel appeared to excite a more than ordinary degree of interest. She went off beautifully, having her topgallant yards, and royal masts. up, and she entered into her destined element as if she felt "at home."
