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at the time the political changes were going on in Canada, by which the democratic party were driven from office, the very same revolution was being effected in Nova Scotia, where the Liberal party have been for some time at the head of affairs. The grounds of the contest there and in Canada seem too, to be identical—the ministry seeking to administer the Government on an exclusive plan, against the wishes and feelings of the majority of the constituents. It must be confessed, however, that the struggle is presented under a better aspect in Nova Scotia than in Canada, and that the men who have resigned are not tainted with the suspicion that attaches to their "eminences" Messrs. Hicks and Baldwin. There is, as far as we can learn, nothing of a personal nature in the contest, but on the contrary, it is a fair constitutional trial of parties, such as might take place between the Whigs and Tories at home, and which has not for its object to alter but to confirm the Government. The leaders who have gone out of office are not accused of entertaining Republican principles, or being enemies to British connexion, but they are, as we well know, men of acknowledged talents, great experience, and high standing in society. It is to be regretted that the view they take of Responsible Government should deprive Lord Falkland and the country of their services, but we suppose there was no alternative, and the result will show whether the public believe them to be in the right or the wrong.

LARGE HOGS—A friend has handed us the following weight of Pigs, raised in the South West. We are glad to find that our Agricultural population in these counties are exerting themselves to raise such a valuable article of domestic use:—

"The following pigs were raised by Alexander McLagan, Esquire, and killed a short time since, viz: nine Pigs, 17 months, and four pigs 19 months old; weighing 5120 lbs. or averaging 324 lbs each."

REPEAL MEETING.

At a Meeting of Irishmen and the Friends of Ireland, held in the Band Room, Commercial Building, in Chatham, on Monday, 15th January, 1844:

Mr MICHAEL DUNNE was called to the chair; Mr WM. TAYLOR acted as secretary.

The chairman having explained to the people the nature of the meeting, the following resolutions were put, and passed unanimously.

1st. That the present meeting do form themselves into a Repeal association, to be denominated "The Miramichi Repeal association."

2nd. Resolved—That as Irishmen, we are thoroughly convinced that nothing will do for Ireland but self legislation; that since the Union, Ireland has retrograded in commerce, in the arts, and in manufactures, and that nothing will cure the great evil of absenteeism, but a domestic parliament.

3rd. Resolved—That it is not repugnant either with loyalty, or unity with the Crown of Great Britain, for us inhabitants of New Brunswick to have a parliament here, or in the neighbouring provinces; so we deem it neither repugnant to loyalty or real unity with the Crown, that the Legislative Union of Ireland with Great Britain be repealed forthwith.

Moreover, that the repeal of the parliamentary union, and the giving Ireland a parliament of her own, will be the actual means of uniting the people of the three kingdoms in the strict bond of a more perfect union under the crown of our beloved Sovereign Queen Victoria, whom God preserve many years for the happiness of Her subjects.

4th. Resolved—That we will use every means within our power and the constitution, in aiding the illustrious O'Connell in the obtaining for Ireland, the blessings of a local parliament; and as a test of our sincerity, we now pay into the hands of the Treasurer, the sum as opposite to our respective names, to be transmitted in the usual way to the Loyal National Repeal association of Ireland, in Dublin, for the purpose of aiding the said association in obtaining Ireland's just rights.

5th. Resolved—That a committee of seven be appointed to transact the business of the association, and to consider the best times for calling future meetings, of which due notice will be given; and that the following persons compose the said committee, viz: Michael Dunne, Wm. Taylor, Thomas Farnell, John Bagnal, Daniel Curran, and Michael Curry; and further Resolved, that Mr Bagnal be requested to act as Secretary.

6th. Resolved—That the foregoing resolutions be signed by the chairman and secretary, and that Mr Pierce be required to publish the same in the Gleaner; and that a copy be also sent to the Halifax Register for publication, with a list of the Repealers who have paid their subscriptions.

WHEAT—An American paper remarks:—"It is said that there will be about 118,000,000 bushels of wheat over and above the quantity necessary for home consumption this year. The surplus in the four states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, and Michigan, will it is said, be about 41,900,000. These estimates appear almost incredible. But taking the moiety as the true computation, there will be an enormous surplus. Fifty nine millions of bushels of wheat, reduced to flour, at five bushels to the barrel, would produce 11,900,000 barrels; which at \$4 would give the sum of \$47,200,000. The exports of flour have in no year exceeded \$17,000,000. From this it is evident that if our surplus flour is to find a foreign market, it must be at a reduced price. The price cannot be kept up by monopoly with such an immense surplus in the country."
