WHEAT -An American paper remarks:-"It is said that there will be about 118,000,000 bushels of wheat over and above the quantity necessary for home consumption this year. The overplus in the four states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, and Michigan, will it is said, be about 41,900,000. These estimates appear almost incredible. But taking the moiety as the true computation, there will be an enormous surplus. Fifty nine millions of bushels of wheat reduced to flour, at five bushels to the barrel, would produce 11,800,000 barrels; which at \$4 would give the sum of \$47,200,000. The exports of flour have in no year exceeded \$17,-000,000. From this it is evident that if our surplus flour is to find a foreign market, it must be at a reduced price. The price cannot be kept up by monopoly with such an ammense overplus in the country."
