A letter from Cadiz of the 22nd ult, mentions that the Prince de Joinvilee's arrival from Magodor was expected daily. *Expulsion of Sisters af Charity from Russia.*—Several sisters of charity have bately arrived at Berlin, having been

lately arrived at Berlin, having been conducted to the frontiers of Prussia from their convent, at Wilna, in Russia, which has been suppressed.

They are young women of education and good families, and will return to their principal convent in France. They were put under the charge of Cossacks, of whose treatment they make severe complaints.

The Rains in Germany .- A letter from Munich, of the 16th, informs us, that in consequence of the almost incessant rains, the Iser river has risen to an extraordinary height. An immense quantity of snow had fallen on the mountains, and the cold there was intense.
