It is with concern that we have occasion to notice, that our peaceful and quiet town is fast approaching the concition of some old and more advanced cities, in the number and frequency of those annoyances and misdemeanours, which skulking vagrants commit under the shelter of night. Gangs of thoughtless and cissipated young men may be seen in groups running, whistling at the street corners, and exhibiting a concert of operations. Not many nights ago the stable of a respectable merchant was opened, and a bridle and new saddle taken therefrom. Last night again, at about two o'clock, the dwellings of some sober and peacein cit zens were disturbed, the window sashes being smaihed in by some demoralizing ruffians, and the breach followed up by volleys of stones. * * While on this subject, we think it well to recommend to all shopkeepers about town, the disuse of common pudlocks on their stores, out buildings, and cellar hatches, us we have been credibly informed there exists a confederacy of young scamps, who have been lately purchasing pudlocks of every common form and size, doubtless with the intention of visiting at pleasure, the interior of those buildings and cellurs, whose proprietors confide in

From the Islander of Wednesday last, we copy the following particulars of a riot on Lot Number One, in Prince County, when the High Sheriff and his Deputy were assulted, while in the discharge of his duty.

"James Warburton, Esq , Sheriff of Prince County, has just informed us that he is come to town for taking legal instructions respecting the parties concerned in making an assault up-on his deputy and a party of constables on Monday last,—It appears that, on that day, Mr. Warburton's deputy and a number of constables had proceeded to Lot One, for the purpose of serving Crown Subpoenas, and that after they had succeeded in doing so, a mob collected end followed them for miles, pelting them with stones and with whatever else they could find to convert into mizzles. The attack was of a most determined and atrocious character. One man had his skull laid open by a stone, which struck him with so much force as to rebound upwards to a considerable height. Mr. Sharpe of St. Elenor's received a severe cut on the back of the head; and Mr.H. Green, Deputy Sheriff was struck, (also by a stone,) and considerably bruised on the leg; and others were more or less injured by the mizzles launched against them by the m.b.
