

**NEWCASTLE GRAMMAR SCHOOL.**—The Grammar School of Newcastle, taught by John Sewewright, A. M., was examined on Tuesday, 4th June, in presence of John A. Street, Esq., Trustee, the Rev. S. Bacon, Rev. W. Henderson, and a number of the Parents and Guardians of the pupils. The pupils were first examined in reading and spelling, and gave great satisfaction by the distinctness of their pronunciation, and the taste which they displayed in reading. In English Grammar they evinced an intimate acquaintance with the principles of Etymology and Syntax, and displayed much facility in applying the various rules in parsing. They were next examined on the History of England, and answered with great readiness the numerous questions put to them on this branch of their study. In Geography they underwent a very searching examination, and showed that they were well acquainted, not only with its principles, but also with its details. They explained the use of the various lines marked on the maps, and pointed out with the greatest readiness the various positions of the different kingdoms of the world, together with their smaller divisions, cities, rivers, lakes, &c. The beautiful new set of school-room maps, which has just been procured for the use of the school will, no doubt, be of great service to the pupils in this department of their studies. A few of the pupils were then examined in Geometry, when they demonstrated several propositions from Euclid, and underwent an interrogatory examination which showed that they were well grounded in the principles of this interesting science. They next exhibited their manuscripts both of writing and arithmetic. The writing manifested that great care had been taken both by themselves and by their Teacher. Their manuscripts of arithmetic, algebra, trigonometry, and navigation, were very neatly and tastefully executed, and seemed to give great satisfaction to the visitors. They were then examined in the classics. Passages were read in Greek from Homer's Iliad, Xenophon's Anabasis, and the Greek New Testament, and in Latin, from Horace, Liby, and Cæsar, after which they underwent a strict examination on the construction and parsing of the passages read, which proved that they had been very carefully instructed in the principles of both languages. The whole exhibition was very creditable to the pupils themselves, and to the ability and attention of their Teacher.

Two of the former Trustees of this school, the Rev. Mr Souter, and Mr W. N. Venning, having left the place, the Rev. Mr Henderson, and Henry B. Allison, Esquire, have been appointed Trustees in their place.—Communicated
