

GOVERNOR GENERAL.—The Montreal Courier says:—"We gave in our paper of Wednesday some particulars, which we found in the Times, of an operation performed on His Excellency the Governor General; we have since ascertained that this account is utterly incorrect; no operation with the knife has been performed at all. An application of a powerful caustic is made daily by Dr. Pollock, which causes considerable pain; and that gentleman has pronounced the disease not to be a cancer—a fact which we are truly rejoiced to hear. None of the Kingston papers mention the circumstance."

ICE IN THE ATLANTIC.—We are indebted to the St. John Courier, for the following paragraph. This may account for the non-arrival of a number of vessels which have been expected for some time at this port:—

"The ship Wakefield and the brig Jane A. Melvain, which arrived at this port the present week, from Britain, encountered ice on the passage and sustained some damage; and we notice that some of the vessels at Halifax and Quebec also report having been entangled in it. The brig William arrived at Halifax from Liverpool, was in the ice from the 7th to the 11th of May, and suffered considerable damage having her starboard bow and port stove in, and her cutwater started. The Acadien at Halifax, from the Clyde, was eight days in the ice, and during the time saw several other vessels in the same dangerous position."

SAINT DOMINGO.—Late intelligence from this island, obtained in New York, reports that the blacks had been entirely successful in their engagement with the Government troops. The Revolutionists had established an independent form of government in the Spanish part of the Island. It is expected that the French Admiral, who has been lying off Port Republic, with several frigates, waiting the issue of events, will take possession of the Island, making the inability of the Government to pay the indemnity due to France, a pretext for so doing.

THE FISHERY BOUNTY ACT.—The following paragraph copied from the Saint John Chronicle, give another instance of the slovenly manner in which our Legislators perform their duty to their constituents.

"We regret to learn that almost the only measure of the last session of the Legislature, from which any benefit was anticipated, namely, the law to encourage the Fisheries, is likely to prove inoperative in a great degree, owing to the careless manner in which the act has been framed. Practical difficulties have already occurred at the Custom House and Treasury, in clearing out Fishing vessels; the act not specifying with sufficient accuracy, various particulars which are essential to the obtaining the bounty. But although these, perhaps, may be got over, through the leniency of the public officers, there is one grand obstacle which cannot be surmounted. In consequence of a most unfortunate blunder, it seems, owners of vessels from ten to fifty tons burthen, can claim bounty only to the amount of ten shillings for each vessel, while those of from fifty to a hundred tons are entitled to 12s 6d per ton; so that a vessel of fifty-one tons may draw a bounty of upwards of £30, while the disappointed and perhaps ruined owner of a fifty ton craft, must be content with ten shillings—Where is the remedy for such abominable negligence? We repeat, emphatically, where is the remedy?"

UNITED STATES.—We have devoted a very large space of our paper to-day, to the account given in the American papers, of the most frightful and bloody faction fight and outrages, which have been perpetrated in Philadelphia. The heart sickens while we read the details, and there is every reason to apprehend, that tranquillity is not permanently established. The Catholic Bishop of Philadelphia, issued a card, stating to his people that he felt it his duty to suspend the exercise of public worship in the chapel until it could be resumed with safety.

The following is the latest account we have received. It is an extract of a letter dated at Philadelphia on Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock, nearly two days later than the intelligence given in another page.

"The riots are over for the present. How long we shall have quiet, I know not. The military continue on duty—the disputed districts are under martial law—horsemen are to be seen in all directions riding about from post to post. The Governor remains in the city to be on the ground in case of another outbreak."

"It has just been rumoured, but I believe there is no foundation for it, that the Irish, driven from their homes, have returned this after-

noon, and attacked the scattering crowds of persons in their section of the county."

"The troops are on duty there, and if there had been any truth in the report, intelligence would have been communicated to the Mayor General at his headquarters, the Girard Bank. I have just been there, and they report all quiet."

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—On Saturday morning last, a young man of the name of John McLean, son of Mr John McLean, Engineer to Messrs. Holderness & Chilton, of Richibucto, was instantaneously killed by the bursting of the barrel of a large Pistol, which he was in the act of discharging; a considerable portion of which penetrated his chest to the depth of six or seven inches.
