

Avuce. GUANO TRADE.—A letter from a gentleman in England to an individual in Boston, says that from 700 to 800 vessels are engaged in Britain in this trade.

THE SEASON.—During the last 6 weeks we do not think there were three days on which rain did not fall, and throughout many of them it descended in torrents. Notwithstanding which, the potatoes, wheat, and oats, look unusually strong and vigorous, and should kind Providence bestow on us through the present month, warm sunny weather, there is every prospect that our farmers will reap an abundant harvest. A good deal of hay has been cut down, which must have received damage by the heavy rains on Wednesday and Thursday night. Yesterday was a fine day, and the sun shines out clear this morning.

FREDERICTON.—The Loyalist states that a Mr. Maginn, has been prevented from delivering a course of Lectures on the subject of Repeal, by the Public Authorities at Fredericton.

THE SALADIN'S CREW.—We were in error in stating that Car, and Galloway were found guilty of Piracy—they were acquitted of that crime as well as of Murder, and the papers received by the last mail state that they will be set at liberty after the execution of their companions Jones, Anderson, Johnson, and Hazleton, who it appears were to suffer death on Tuesday morning last. These four men pleaded guilty.

SECOND ENGLISH JULY MAIL.

To the kindness of Edward Cunard, Esq., we were this morning put in possession of the Liverpool European Times of the 19th ult, received by the Steamer St. George, which vessel conveyed the mail over to Charlottetown. It was brought to Halifax by the Caledonia, but what day she arrived, we have not ascertained.

Next Friday, the mail for this quarter will be received here, ten days after its receipt on this side of the Atlantic. Truly we have great cause to be satisfied with the Post-Office department.

We have delayed the publication of our Journal some time, to enable us to furnish our readers with some extracts.

PARLIAMENTARY.—The motion by Mr. Duncombe, for a committee to inquire into the Post-office espionage, which took place on the evening of the day that the last packet sailed, was accepted to by the Government, but under circumstances which marred the grace of the boon. A committee was granted, but Sir James Graham insisted it should be a secret committee, and in order that its deliberations should not be needlessly frittered away by hair-splitting, Lawyers were excluded.

The Parliament are anxiously waiting the result of the State Prisoners' Appeal to the House of Lords, on the writ of error. To the Judges who were present, and who, at the termination of the proceedings, were obliged to leave for their respective circuits, a number of queries, involving the technical points of the appeal, have been submitted by the Lord Chancellor, and judgment will be given when their decision has been received. In the meantime, it is believed, that the Counsel for O'Connell and the other Traversers, have picked out so many and such fatal flaws in the "monster indictment," and the trial founded on it, that it cannot sustain the conviction. Indeed the Lord Chancellor admitted that the Jury list was "fraudulently made up;" an admission which will be turned to good account hereafter, whatever may be the result of the appeal. It will be seen, by reference to a statement made at the Repeal Association on Monday last, by Mr. O'Connell, jun., that his father had

no hopes that the appeal to the House of Lords would be successful.

The subject of the Slave Trade was brought before the House of Commons, on Tuesday last, by Lord Palmerston. This is one of his Lordship's favourite hobbies, and on this occasion he rode it at great length. The speech depicted the horrors of the traffic in terms eloquently pathetic. Sir Robert Peel is just as much opposed to the trade as his antagonist, only he does not go the "whole hog" for its suppression.

COMMERCIAL.—Our leading mercantile markets exhibit decided symptoms of returning activity. Money is abundant, at a low rate of interest, and in the face of the hostile position of affairs between France & Morocco, involving the possibility of a rupture between the former country and Great Britain, English securities continue to advance. The weather has been most favourable for the growing crops, which are in excellent condition, and, with the prospect of cheaper bread stuffs, we may look forward with confidence to an increase in the consumption of other articles of food.

The cotton market, it will be seen by reference to our reports, is in a drooping state. The sales are limited, and prices, which receded an eighth last week, have gone back fully to that extent during the present week. The stock on hand in this market now exceeds One Million of Bales.

FOREIGN.—The principal foreign interest of the last fortnight is centered in the squabble between France and Morocco, which is in a fair way, it will seem, of adjustment. France has no desire to extend its dominions in Africa, and the Emperor of Morocco finds his cue in healing a breach with so formidable a foe. The result will be limit the range of Abdel-Kader's power of doing mischief, and thereby to consolidate the French possessions of Algeria. Nearer home, Louis Philippe has been getting into disgrace by calling upon the nation to make provision for the members of his family.

The Madrid Gazette of the 1st contains the following revolting summary of the executions in only one district of Catalonia:—"Between the 1st of February and the 15th of June, the 'faction' in the Maestrazzo have sustained the following losses:—Killed on the field of battle, 54 men; shot, after being made prisoners, 120 men; pardoned, for various reasons, 107. Among the prisoners shot are the chiefs El-Serador, Viscaro, Lauva and Taso; Marsal and his lieutenant, Pilairen, Cotarro and his second, Martinez El Serano, Taranques, and Galofe Santa Oleon, and 25 generals or officers, including a colonel, one commandant, three captains, and thirteen lieutenants. Since the 26th of May, 14 spies and 19 officers coming from France, and a certain number of douaniers who had joined the bands, have been shot. General Don Juan de Villalonga has by this energetic activity, not a little contributed to this result."

The Russian Government has at length acknowledged the constitutional government in Greece.

The latest accounts from Athens describes Greece as on the eve of another party strife. Some rioting had taken place in the capital, and "Viva the Constitution" were vociferated under the king's windows. An affray followed, in which two persons were killed. The elections were nearly over. In Messenia, five individuals lost their lives in an electioneering broil.

DOMESTIC.—One of the most prominent topics of the day is the result of the contest for Birmingham. It has terminated in the return of Mr Spooner, the Conservative. There were three candidates—the gentleman we have named; Mr Scholefield, the son of the late member; and Mr Joseph Sturge, the celebrated anti-slavery and chartist advocate.

The Iron Trade.—As an instance of the increasing briskness of the above trade, we may mention that the shipping agent at Newport of a large establishment on the hills, in one day last week received by post, advices of charter parties, for cargoes to be shipped, amounting to 3,000 tons of railway iron.

The House of Lords has decided against the claim of Sir Augustus d'Este, to the Sussex Peerage—grounding their opinion on the construction of the Royal Marriage act.

The Revenue.—The usual returns of the revenue exhibits an increase in the Customs for the quarter, of £312,026; in the Excise of £85,479; in the Stamps of £46,023; in the Taxes of £5,043; and in the Post Office of £10,000; being a total increase in the ordinary revenue of £458,574 on the quarter. There is, however, a decrease in the Property tax of £9,224; in the Crown Lands of £2,500; and in

the Miscellaneous—from there being only a small portion of the remittances from China included in the present quarter—of £641,337. Including the extraordinary revenue, the whole increase in the quarter is £494,924, and the whole decrease £674,223, showing a balance of decrease of £176,299. The revenue is so much worse this quarter than for the corresponding quarter of last year. The revenue for the year is altogether £2,448,336 better than the revenue for the last year, ending at the same period. The Customs have increased in the year £835,339; the Excise, £120,073; and £1,929,666 more Property-tax has been collected. The falling off in the Miscellaneous revenue in the year was £1,154,401.

A naval station is to be established at the Cove of Cork.

It is calculated that the O'Connell tribute this year will reach £30,000.

The present military force in Ireland amounts to 26,000 men, independent of enrolled Chelsea out-pensioners and armed police.

The new Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, Lord Heytesbury, is expected to enter on his duties at Dublin Castle on the 20th inst. Lord de Grey and his suite left on the 15th.

On the 13th instant, says an Irish paper, "Mr. O'Connell commenced his great literary labour, his 'Life and Times,' or by what other style and title his projected autobiography is to be distinguished, employing Mr. O'Neill Daunt as his amanuensis."

The Wesleyan Education Fund now in process of collection, amounts to £11,336 6s 7d.

Twenty thousand Pitmen met last week at Shaden-hill, who passed resolutions to continue the strike.

A Parliamentary return states, that the sums paid and owing to the short hand writers' reports, relative to the State Trials in Ireland, amounted to £3,096.

The number of Petitions for the Repeal of the Union, presented up to the 1st June, was 415, of signatures 875,489.
