Saint Andrews, at the earliest possible moment, for the purpose of concerting as to the measures necessary to be adopted to meet the alarming exigency,"

FAIR AT NEWCASTLE .- Our first Fair was held in the Public Square in Newcastle, on Tuesday and Wednesday last. There was a considerable show of beef cattle, pigs, sheep, lambs, and milch cows, and we understand a number were disposed of at fair prices. There were also a large number of horses on the ground, but with few exceptions, they were very inferior, and the owners consequently were unable to dispose of them. Why there were not more of a superior description, we are at a loss to conjecture, as good horses at present are in demand, and the dealers in horse flesh from Westmorland, and our neighbours in Novascotia, are constantly bringing them into the County, for which they are obtaining high prices.

We should liked to have seen some of our Domestic Manufactures as well as the Produce of our Dairies in the market, but we saw nothing of the kind exhibited. We hope at the next Fair, which is to be held at the same place in March next, that this defect will be remedied, and that every description of domestic manufactures, produce of the dairies, as well as cattle and horses, will be exhibited for sale.

Considering that this was the first attempt of the kind, the amount of business transacted was very satisfactory; and When the inhabitants get better acquainted with the system of conducting fairs, we feel persuaded the amount of business done at them will be considerably augmented, and much benefit will accrue to our farmers from their institution.

THE GREAT BRITAIN, it appears, made her voyage home from New York, in a Passage of 154 days. On one occasion she made 298 miles from noon to noon. An English Journal contains the following paragraph on the subject of this vessel:

"Captain Hosken reports very favorably of the powers of the screw, and of the ship's machinery. During the whole passage the engines have never been stopped, but have worked with the greatest possible regularity. The reason of the passage being of somewhat longer duration than was expected, is in the difficulty of keeping a sufficient supply of steam. This difficulty her commander and engineer are, however, fully confident of overcoming in her future voyages."

SINGULAR POTATOE .- A gentleman in Chatham, who takes a lively interest in all matters connected with the improvement of our Agriculture, handed us one day last week, a very peculiar potatoe. It weighs only 13 ounces, but has the astohishing number of 40 eyes, all of which could easily be extracted. It was derived from the Rohan potatoe, the seed of which was introduced into this county about three years since; but having been planted in the vicinity of the red and kidney kinds, it partakes largely of the features of both of them-having the red skin of the former, and the long shape of the lat-

As we consider it a curiosity, we shall pleasure shew it to any person who may feel disposed to examine it.

POTATOE ROT .- We regret to state, that from conversations we have had with our farmers, we find that the Potatoes in this county have suffered considerably from the Peculiar disease which has done so huch damage to this valuable esculent in almost all portions of the globe. The evil the coasiderably augmented from the ignolance of parties as to what is best to be done with them, or what steps they ought to take to stop the progress of the rot, which is hourly augmenting.

We should feel much pleasure in comand strong the opinions of any of our gricultural neighbours on the subject.
