"I observe from the correspondence which you have held with one of the projectors of this undertaking that you withold your encouragement to it until you shall first ascertained my views with respect to it. I regret, therefore, that I am not qualified by the information at present before me to propounce any opinion present before me to pronounce any opinion upon the project, which you will observe is very comprehensive, and at the same time very in-

definite.

"It does not yet appear to have been ascertained what will be the exact line of this Railroad, nor whether the undertaking be really a practicable one. It is not stated who are the promoters of it, nor what capital they have at their command, nor within what period of time it is estimated that the Railway would be made; and no estimate seems to have been formed of the probable returns for the investment necessarily required in the undertaking. But I will not hesitate at the same time to say, that if solvent parties were willing to undertake the construction of a Railway from Halifax to Quebec or the River St. Lawrence, through the heart of the provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, the project would be one deserving of every consideration from the local legislature.
