

felony by the law of the land; whereas, for a system, based for the most part on falsehood and deceit, there appears to be no legal restraint—certainly no legal remedy. Now that people have time to reflect and to analyze, they find that out of 23 sets of provisional committees, the name of one party appears 23 times; the names of two others, 19 times; of three, 17 times, of 14 14 times; of 33, 8 times; of 29, 9 times; and of 22, 10 times! Can further proof be needed of the systematic attack upon the pockets of the lieges, which the cunning and clever scoundrelism has worked?

NEW ZEALAND.

Liverpool, Tuesday Morning.—By the arrival yesterday of the Tryphane, from New Zealand, we have advices to the 17th of May, the contents of which are of some importance, as showing the unsettled and dangerous state of things in the colony. Our last advices were to the 3d of May, and stated generally, the fact of an outbreak of the natives, and the capture of Pomore by her Majesty's forces. The more recent accounts give details of the further operations, directed principally against a stronghold in the possession of a rebel chief, John Heki, which, however, do not seem to have been successful, although the serious loss of life is said to have been the result to Heki's followers amounting, by one account, to 200 men killed. On our side the loss is stated at 11 killed 37 wounded. The position of the natives was a very strong one, and very obstinately defended. The British force, consisting of troops of the 58th, and 96th regiments with seamen and marines from the Staines Castle, Velocity, and Aurora, ultimately retired in good order from the scene of contest. It is doubtful from the accounts, whether the affair will not rather encourage than depress the rebellious followers of Heki, who is still at large and expected to be very troublesome.

Several of the reports are very contradictory. One of them states that, during the absence of the troops, the boats of the Hazard and North Star burnt five villages, and destroyed ten cocoa canoes belonging to John Heki, and sent off four European boats which had been stolen, and, with the canoes, were hauled up amongst the houses. After the action, the whole of the parties engaged, with the wounded, were embarked, and returned to Auckland.

Statements have been published in the New Zealand journals to the effect that the late war at the Bay of Islands had been occasioned by an European, whose name is not given. This person, whoever he may be, is said to have told the chiefs that the British flag was the emblem of slavery and robbery; that, if they did not resist in time, they would be served as the natives of New Holland and Van Deamen's Land had been served—namely, deprived of their lands and reduced to a state of vassalage. It was under the influence of this advice (the report goes) that Heki first cut down the British flagstaff, and made the subsequent onslaught at the Bay of Islands. The chief, Pomore, who had been captured and taken on board the Hazard, was subsequently liberated on the understanding that he would assist in the promotion of British interests.

Russia.—It appears from intelligence received via Constantinople, that the Russians have suffered a second defeat at the hands of the Circassians, and that the results of the campaign are more disastrous for the Emperor than was anticipated. The correspondent of the Morning Chronicle at the Turkish capital writes upon the 17th ultimo as follows:—

"Dargo was not occupied a single day by Count Woronzoff. His retreat after his pretended victory was immediate; and it appears that he was followed hotly by Schamil, at the head of a very numerous body of mountaineers. At Jani-Ouchy, in Georgia, another battle has taken place. The Count made a halt in that town thinking to bring his army, which was much disorganized and demoralized by a precipitate retreat following a disastrous campaign, into some order before he proceeded further. But Schamil allowed him no time. He at once attacked the Russians, and, after a very bloody conflict, discomfited and routed them completely. The accounts, which may be relied upon, say that the army under Woronzoff has been totally beaten. The loss sustained by the Russians must be very great, for one hundred and eighty of their officers have been killed in this last action. Amongst them are one general officer, two aid-de-camps of Woronzoff, and one aid-de-camp of General Gluck. Count Woronzoff distin-

guished himself in this, as in the former battle, by great personal bravery. He is represented as having been engaged in the *melee*, fighting as a common soldier, and is said to have been preserved by an officer from the most imminent peril of being either taken prisoner or slain. He arrived at Tefls on the 3d of September with the wreck of his army. He left four guns behind him, and ammunition, stores and a great quantity of baggage, at Jani-Ouchy, in the possession of the enemy. The Russian army fled, rather than retreated, from that scene of defeat.

"Thus has terminated a campaign from which so much was promised. This, the most determined effort Russia has ever made to subdue the Circassians, has ended so disastrously that one would think she would henceforward abandon all hope of success in this object. Woronzoff's army at the opening of this year may be computed at about 50,000 men, the largest force that has yet attempted to penetrate the Caucasus. Of these, on a moderate calculation, from 12,000 to 15,000 must have perished in battle, and probably several thousands more must have fallen a sacrifice to the singularly severe privations and hardships to which they have been exposed, and of which Woronzoff, in his published despatches cannot forbear to complain."
