

Resolved.—That the Representatives of this County, and of the Township of Amherst, be respectfully requested to give their best assistance to effect said Railroad; and that in doing so, while they cordially co-operate with those who have the interest of the Province at heart, they are at the same time to hold themselves unfettered by any company formed in London, and any proceedings adopted in the city of Halifax,—this meeting considering that the success of this measure depends upon the free action of the Provincial Legislature convened.

Resolved.—That these Resolutions be forwarded to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, through the usual channel, with the respectful request of this meeting, that His Excellency will be graciously pleased to bring the subject of the said Railroad before the Legislature, in such manner as may best advance the objects of this meeting, and that the Hon. Alexander Stewart, Member of H. M. Executive Council, for this Province, be requested to communicate information to His Excellency, in reference to the objects of this meeting.

Resolved.—That the Secretary of this meeting be requested to refer James B. Uniacke, Esq., for the proceedings of this meeting, to the Hon. A. Stewart; and that the thanks of this meeting be tendered to the County of Halifax Committee for their obliging communications thereon.

A similar meeting was held at Truro, on the 12th inst. A Report of a committee of gentlemen appointed at a previous meeting was read and adopted, and the following resolutions passed unanimously.

Resolved.—That a Memorial be prepared; to be generally signed by the Freeholders of this County, praying the Legislature to afford every facility to any Company that may embark with sufficient capital to complete the Railroad now contemplated to connect Halifax and Quebec by the way of Truro.

Resolved.—That a Provisional Committee be now appointed to correspond with the Secretary of the Provisional Committee in Halifax.

The following persons were then named, and upon being moved and seconded, it was unanimously—

Resolved.—That the Committee consist of John Ross, Esq., M. P. P., Wm. Fleming, Esq., M. P. P., John Crow, Esq., M. P. P., Glord McLellan, Esq., M. P. P., Doctor John Waddle, John Wier, A. L. Archibald, Joseph Dickson, Charles Tucker, Joseph Crow, John Weaver, Alexander Kent, Charles Blanchard, Adams G. Archibald, Mark P. Martin, and E. F. Munro, Esquires; and that E. F. Munro be Secretary and Convener of the Committee.

CANADA.—The Montreal papers of the 15th inst., state that there was a rumour in circulation, that Quebec had been visited by another fire. The passengers on board the Steamer Quebec, on her passage up, when at Point aux Trembles, report that flames were seen by them, and they entertained no doubt that another extensive conflagration had occurred in that city.

A block of six brick houses—situate in Queen's Square, Montreal, was destroyed by fire on the 26th inst.

The property of Mr Wood, late of Toronto, valued at £70,000, has fallen to the wife of a corporal of the 16th foot, as heir at law.

HALIFAX.—An attempt was made by some incendiary to set fire to a house in Prince Street, owned by Mr Studley. A reward has been offered by the Mayor for the apprehension of the scoundrel. A Night Watch has been instituted.

FIRE IN CHATHAM.—Flames were seen issuing from the roof of the large building in Chatham, known as "Johnson's Hotel," about 6 o'clock on the evening of Wednesday last. By prompt application of water, the fire was arrested in its course, not however, until the premises received considerable damage, particularly in the attic, from the very liberal use of axes.

THE SEASON.—The weather has been very variable during the week. We spoke last week of heavy rain having fallen—this was immediately succeeded by a cold snap, with wind from the North and North West. Considerable ice formed in the booms and river. Thursday and Thursday night a strong breeze blew from the South and South West, and torrents of rain fell. Yesterday was fine with the wind from the North West. Our river is now as clear of ice as at

midsummer. All the vessels in port, we understand, are ready for sea.

EXTRAORDINARY DESPATCH.—The bark Carlton, of about 460 tons, consigned to Messrs. Cunards, arrived at their steam mill wharf on Tuesday evening last. She discharged her ballast, and commenced taking in cargo at 12 o'clock at noon on Wednesday—and finished a full and complete cargo, yesterday afternoon at six o'clock, being only two days and six hours, completing her lading. The work is well done, and her cargo stowed as faithfully as if it was performed in midsummer. Who can beat this? The Carleton we believe, arrived at a later period of the year than any vessel which loaded and proceeded to sea the same season.

RIO GRANDE.—The New York Journal of Commerce of the 10th Nov. gives the following important item of intelligence from Rio Grande.—"We learn from Capt. Doty, of the barque Rosina, arrived yesterday, from Rio Grande 26th Sept. that the combined fleets of England and France had taken possession of the following ports, viz: Maldonado, St Lucia, and Colonia, and the fleet had gone up to take possession of Buenos Ayres."

FISH, FLESH, FOWL AND VEGETABLES.—A late number of the Liverpool Albion contains the following extraordinary piece of intelligence:—

"It is a singular fact that fatal diseases are, at the present moment, prevailing amongst members of all the above-named tribes. Cattle, as our readers know, have long been afflicted with a distemper which has destroyed numbers; grouse have died in hundreds of some malady, which has been variously described; and the murrain amongst potatoes has destroyed the crops over a great portion of Europe. It is now stated that a plague of some description has broken out amongst the fish in the rivers, numbers of pike, eels, and other fish being found dead, or dying on the surface of the water."

LIGHT HOUSE OF THE ISLANDS OF SAINT PIERRE AND MIQUELON.

This Light House is situated upon a Bluff, called "Gallantry Head," (just above Cape Noir) on the Southern part of the Island of St. Pierre.

The Light is a fixed one, and is elevated 64 French Metres, (equal to 210 English Feet) above high water mark, and, it is calculated, may be seen at a distance of 18 or 20 miles.

The Light will be seen at Sea from W. N. W. to N. N. E., six degrees East by Compass, in passing by the Louth.

It will be shut in by the high lands of Saint Pierre from the N. N. E., six degrees East, to W. N. W., by Compass, passing by the North.

Its Geographical position is North Latitude 46 degrees 45 minutes 20 seconds, West Longitude from Paris 55 degrees 50 minutes 00 seconds.
