

## The Fredericton Mail.

The Fredericton Mail arrived yesterday Morning at 6 o'clock. But contains nothing of interest.

The Captain and 1st Engineer of the Marquett, (whose explosion is noticed in another part of our paper) have been held to bail in \$2000, at New Orleans, after an examination before Judge McCaleb, to await the action of the grand jury.

**OREGON EXPEDITION.**—The U. S. Dragoons under the command of Col. Kearney, were at the forks of the Platte on the 4th ult. They intend to take the route of the Oregon emigrants so as to afford them all necessary protection as far as the South Pass then returning to Fort Laramie on the Platte, cross to Bent's Fort on the Arkansas, and following the Santa Fe train arrive in the fall at Fort Leavenworth. Two other companies of Dragoons are to visit Lake Traverse and the North Red river for the purpose of preventing the incursions of "Half Breeds" from Canada, and to exercise a proper influence over the Sioux and other tribes of the north of Iowa.
