COLONIAL PRESS.—The Quebec Ga-
zette of the 12th instant, has the follow-
ing remarks on the subject of our Pro-
vincial politics:—
"The example of our Canadian res-
ponsible has proved contagious with the
St. John papers that four of the Ex-
ecutive Councillors of that province—viz:
Messrs. Johnston, Chandler, Ha-
zelet, and Wilnot—have tendered their
resignations in consequence of the recent
appointment of Mr. Reade, (Private Sec-
retary to the Lieutenant Governor), to
the office of Provincial Secretary, which
was made by His Excellency without
previously consulting his responsible ad-
visers. The Council had been equally
divided on the subject, the hon. Messrs.
Simonds, Simonds, Cunard, and Mon-
tgomery retaining their seats at the Board.
His Excellency, it is said, remains firm,
and a collision with the Assembly is ex-
pected to result, a large majority, it is as-
sumed, being in favor of the retiring
councillors. The same mischievous el-
ement, it will thus be seen, arise wherever
this new-fangled system is adopted, the
New Brunswick Legislature, our readers
will recollect, having at a former session
adopted and placed on its Journals the
amous Canadian resolutions of 1841. It
appears to us unfortunate for the advo-

cates of Responsible Government, and
places the principle in a very questionable
point of view, that interests more of a
selfish nature than of public utility should
uniformly be the operating cause in their
ruptures with the powers that be."
