Halifax Post, May 13.

Late American papers state, that the American Squadron which was designed and fitted out for the Mediterranean has been ordered to the coast of Mexico, for the purpose of negotiating with that power regarding the annexation of Texas to the Union.

The cold weather of the last fortnight, has been succeeded by breezes, one degree warmer, at least.

European News.

From British Papers to the 19th April, received by the Hibernia, Steamer.

The Baltic, during the last month, was filled with ice.

The fete of Long Champs was not enjoyed in Paris, owing to the severity of the weather and the heaps of snow in the streets.

Miss Linwood is dead, a lady celebrated for the exquisite productions of her needle. She executed 64 pieces, historical and landscapes, in embroidery, and was offered \$15,000 for a Salvator Mundi. Her last work occupied her about ten years.

Great injuries occurred in February throughout Italy by rain floods, thunder storms, and hurricanes.

Alexander Blackwood, one of the proprietors of Blackwood's Magazine, is dead.

The monster bell cast for York minister consumed 17 tons of metal. It is to be rung by two wheels each 14 feet in diameter, requiring the exertions of 15 men.

Gigantic Bridge—A stupendous wooden bridge has just been erected over the River Lowther, between Clifton and Brougham-hall, and close to the stone viaduct over the same river, now in the course of erection for the Lancaster and Carlisle Railway. It is 530 feet in length, 18 feet in width, and 110 feet in height; and there have been used in its construction 26,000 cubic feet of timber, and 30 tons of iron.

The Madrid journals announce the arrest of a famous brigand, named Jose Sastre, who is charged with having committed one hundred and seventeen murders.

During the week policies of marine insurance have come over from London, with a clause protecting the underwriters, from loss, in case of the capture of vessels by a foreign enemy.

The English Prelates of the Roman Catholic Church to the number of ten or eleven, at present in London, forwarded last week to Sir Robert Peel their united thanks for his conduct on the Maynooth Grant.

The Screw Propeller.—In the trials which were instituted by the Admiralty between two vessels, to test the qualities of the screw propeller Rattler and the paddle wheel Alecto, the superiority of the Rattler has been fully shown. In one of the trials which took place on the 30th of March, during a perfect calm, from the Little Nore to Yarmouth Roads (eighty miles) the Rattler beat the Alecto 23 1/2 minutes, although the Rattler, in consequence of a short supply of steam, was compelled to work the second grade of expansion throughout the day, and the engines only 23 1/2 to 24 strokes per minute. On arriving at Yarmouth Roads they started again, both vessels having all sails set to a moderate breeze. They continued running until off Cromer Light, when the Rattler, in 34 miles, beat the Alecto by 13 minutes.

Ruins of an Ancient City.—Mr Laurie, whose mission is to the Mountain Nestorians, in a letter dated in August, gives a brief account of the wonders which M. Botta, the French Consul in Persia, is bringing to light at Khorsabad. At this place, he is excavating the earth, and bringing before the light of day the ruins of a mighty city, consisting of towers, pieces of sculpture, large rooms or parts of houses, one of which is a hundred feet in length. One of the pieces of sculpture represents a royal feast, with chairs and tables in the European style; another represents the siege of a city.

The French government, Mr Laurie says, has sent out an accomplished artist, to take drawings of the whole. Judging from what I have seen, the literary world will have no cause to mourn the absence of the originals. The designs of the Assyrian sculptor are reproduced in all their life, and the co-

pies bid fair to awaken more interest now than did the originals in the days of their glory.

It is the design of the government to issue the whole in the magnificent style in which its work on Persepolis is to appear. M. Botta has already more than a hundred folio pages of inscriptions, and M. Flandin has a still greater quantity of the most exquisite drawings. As many as ninety men have sometimes been employed at once in the excavations; and the work has been prosecuted without interruption during the heat of summer, and still two thirds of the mound remain untouched.
