"We would not wish any hasty legislation on such an important subject; let the first step be taken by the production and examination by the House of Assembly of the Commission of Inquiry. Let the House express its opinion on the subect, and then let it be followed, if the House decide in its favor, by an Address to His Excellency, requesting him to communicate to the Home Government the opinion of the Provincial Parliament on the necessity of making such altera-tions in the Post Office system, as applied to this Colony, as will give more satisfaction than the existing one.

We are convinced that an enquiry of this kind would be a very popular thing; for we are sure that there is no department in the Province with the conduct of which the people find so much fault as with that of the Post Office."
