All the premiums of 10s. and upwards, to be competed for by members of the Society only: the premiums under 10s. to be open for general competition. In all cases, whether there be any competition or not, it will be in the discretion of the Committee to withhold a premium, if in their opinion, the objects offered are not worthy of it.

It is a standing rule of the Society— "That the premiums to be awarded shall be confined under the rules of competition to that class of persons coming under the description of Farmers, and who depend principally upon the cultivation of the soil for a livelihood."

NORTHUMBERLAND AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

The Society will hold Two PLOUGHING MATCHES in OCTOBER next. The first to take place in Chatham, on Wednesday, the 1st of October; the second at Douglastown on the following day, Thursday 2nd of October. The sum of £6 will be offered as Premiums at each of the Ploughing Matches, subject to the under-mentioned conditions:—

- 1st CLASS. Open to all competitors, except the persons who have received the first prize on any former Ploughing Match of the Society. For the best Ploughman 1 5 0 Second best do 1 0 0 Third best do 0 15 0 2nd CLASS.

Open to natives of the Colonies, and persons from the old country who arrived in the Colonies when under 15 years of age, except the winners of the first prize in this class at any former Ploughing Match of the Society.

- For the best Ploughman 1 5 0 Second best do 1 0 0 Third best do 0 15 0

CONDITIONS.

1st. The Premiums to be awarded by three Judges, whose names will be announced by the Board on the morning of competition.

2nd. The teams intended to compete must be the property of members of the Society.

3rd. The owner of a team may if he see fit, employ his son or steward to hold the plough.

4th. No driver to be allowed.

5th. The particular ridge or portion assigned to each team, to be determined by lot.

6th. The size of the Furrow to be 8 inches broad by 4 1/2 inches deep.

7th. The teams to be on the ground by half past nine o'clock, and ready to start by 10 o'clock, a.m.

8th. The Judges to determine and announce before starting, the quantity of ground to be ploughed; the length of time allowed for the performance of it; and any further conditions that may be deemed necessary.

The Judges shall be at liberty to reserve the three premiums in each class, should the work performed in their opinion, not deserve this mark of approbation, or in case of a sufficient number of teams not coming forward to afford fair scope for competition. By Order of the Board.
