One day in the early part of last week, as the Rev. Mr Brooke was driving with a horse and wagon, the animal became restive, and the Rev. gentleman sprang out, in doing which we regret to learn he received a serious injury in one of his feet.

On Tuesday evening the 9th inst., Vice Admiral Sir Francis Austen arrived here, via St. John, on a visit to Sir Wm. Colebrooke; and departed again on Thursday evening in the steamer Frederickton. He was saluted on his departure by a discharge of Artillery, having been accompanied to the boat by a guard of honor of the 33rd Regiment. He arrived in St. John on Friday, and soon after embarked in the steamer Vesuvius, Commander O'Callaghan, for Halifax. The Admiral was accompanied by his secretary and two of his daughters.

Mr Hudson, the Great Railway "Lion," has (according to the United Service Gazette) stated that the Canada and Nova Scotia Railway Company will commence active operations in the next.

St. John Regatta.—The St. John Regatta which is to take place to-morrow is expected to be a splendid affair, several new boats having been built since last year, which it is said will compete for the prizes. There are to be twelve races, viz: three with first, second, and third class sailing boats; three with first, second and third class gigs; whale-boats, skiffs, wherries, Indian race and Squaw race in canoes, and a gig and punt race.

From Texas.—We have advices from Galveston to the 23d ult. Capt. Gibbons, who sailed from Aransas Bay on the 16th, reports that just before he left the anchorage off the Bay, the steamboat Monmouth came off and reported that war had been declared by Mexico.

The Houston Telegraph of the 21st ult., says that a party of about 70 Mexican soldiers approached within 16 miles of Castroville, about a fortnight previous—Capt. Hays received information of their movements, and went out to attack them; but they were apprised of his approach by one of their spies and hastily decamped.

It is supposed that they intended to attack Castroville for the purpose of capturing a quantity of goods that had deposited there by some Mexican traders.

The American Government continues to send men and ammunitions of war to Texas. The steam ship Lexington left the Brooklyn Navy Yard last week for the Gulf of Mexico. She has on board 600 troops, 250 six-chambered rifles, 500 single do., 1200 muskets, and a large quantity of ammunition.

The Acting Harbour Master of Quebec has given notice to the public, that in consequence of the danger likely to result from Steam Boat racing between that city and Montreal, he will prosecute for breaches of the Steam Boat Laws.
