Verily our little war will prove more vexations than if we had begun with our fifty thousand men at once. Will our government now order out the balance of this number? Will they now seize Tampico? Will they now strike at the heart of Mexico? Or will they procrastinate this war until other and more formidable antagonists have entered the lists against us?

The Courier informs us that the mail which left here on Wednesday last did not reach the Bend in time to meet the Halifax Courier. The delay was occasioned by the difficulty of crossing the Richibucto river—another strong argument in favor of the necessity there exists for erecting a bridge across it. If a similar delay occurs with the mail which leaves to-day, the British steamer will have left before our mail reaches Halifax.

The mails are to be conveyed on such days, and at such hours, as the Deputy Postmaster General may from time to time appoint; and at a rate of speed of not less than Six miles an hour, including stoppages.

Security will be required for the due performance of the service, and a notice of Three Months on either side will determine the Contract.

The Deputy Postmaster General does not bind himself to accept the lowest Tender.
