Great Fire at Vergenes, Vi.—It caught on Tuesday morning about three o'clock in the extensive jewelry establishment of Holcomb & Co., and had then consumed between forty and fifty buildings.

Havana, Jan. 13th, 1846.—Lieut. Peel, son of Sir Robert Peel, arrived here in the last steamer from Vera Cruz, and went to Europe as bearer of dispatches from the Admiral of the English squadron at the Sandwich Islands.

Since his passage a rumour is circulated that the whole English force in the Pacific is making sail for the Columbia River, with orders to anchor there.—Journal of Commerce.

From Washington.—Another "great debate" has taken place in both Houses of Congress on the Oregon Question, but they have not yet come to any determination on the subject. This is all very well. The People of the United States are fond of amusement, and that which they pay the dearest for, is generally the most appreciated.

The Washington letter writers state that Mr. Buchanan, Secretary of State, has tendered his resignation to the President. The correspondent of the Globe says:—The story is correct that Mr. Buchanan has this afternoon tendered his resignation to the President.

From Sierra Leone the U. S. Gazette has dates to Aug. 30, containing we believe no news that we have not already given, but presenting some further details concerning the slave trade, which may be interesting.

The Gazette has the following:—The officer of the Navy, who brought the "Africano" to Sierra Leoua, stated that the towns of Lagos, on the slave coast, having been completely destroyed by the King about three years ago returned in July last with a force of 10,000 men drove out the reigning king, and his people, and took possession of the rivers and town of Onoe.

A schooner called "Marquisha" was captured off Lagos, 29th June last. She was sailing under Brazilian colors, and therefore could not be condemned. It was however a clear case. The Waichman states that the "Marquisha" was formerly a Philadelphia oyster boat called the "Runner," and was built on the Chesapeake.
