DEATH OF JUDGE ARCHIBALD.—The Halifax Guardian contains the following highly laudable tribute to the memory of the above named gentleman, recently deceased.

"Few individuals, we believe, have ever left the stage of time more deservedly esteemed and more universally regretted, than the late Judge ARCHIBALD. Raised by the innate force of his talents, from a humble sphere, he became an ornament alike of the Bar, the Senate, and the Bench, while his characteristic amenity, in all the relations of social life, endeared him to every one with whom he had intercourse, and especially to those who enjoyed the privilege of his intimacy and friendship. How highly he was esteemed by those who had the best means of knowing his worth, may be estimated by the fact, that the Members of the Bench and Bar, at a meeting over which the Honourable the Chief Justice presided, after paying an eloquent tribute to "the amiable manners of the lamented deceased, the exemplary urbanity and courtesy which, during a long professional career, he invariably evinced towards the members of the profession which he adorned and dignified, and to the learning and impartiality which distinguished the discharge of his judicial duties." Resolved, unanimously, to attend his funeral in deep mourning, and to wear crape for one month."

"Participating in these sentiments the two branches of the Legislature likewise resolved to swell the funeral train, on that melancholy occasion, and to suspend the consideration of the public business for that day; and he was thus escorted to his last earthly resting place on Saturday last, by those with whom he had contended for fame and honour in questions of legal or political importance, in the forensic or the Legislative arena, or over whom he had presided as first Commoner of Nova-Scotia or as one of the Judges of the land. His remains were consigned to the silent tomb, but his memory will long endure, not only in the remembrance of those by whom he was known and loved and honoured, but as an incentive to genius struggling against difficulties, and a memento of what talents, conjoined with industry and perseverance, can achieve."

THE SEASON.—Last week we mentioned that the weather had been unusually fine, and highly propitious for prosecuting the business of the country with advantage. Since then a sudden and marked change has taken place. Jack Frost has regularly besieged us. He commenced his assault on Sunday morning, with a snow storm, which continued throughout that day and night, and the greater portion of Monday. On the afternoon of that day it ceased snowing, and the wind commenced to blow with great violence from the North-west, which continued without any abatement until the evening of Tuesday. It then lulled a little; and the frost became intense. Wednesday and Thursday were even colder. Yesterday morning some snow fell, and in the afternoon and night the wind blew piercingly cold from the Northwest.

The high winds drifted up the snow in such a manner as to render the roads almost impassable. The Courier with the Southern mail made an attempt on Tuesday morning to proceed on his journey, but after advancing a short distance, he was compelled to return. Several men accompanied him, who endeavoured to shovel out the road; but they found it a useless task, as the wind blew the snow back as fast as they removed it. As it was intensely cold, some of them got frost-bitten. About noon on Wednesday he again took his departure, and from the accounts we have heard of the

state of the roads, he had a fearful task before him.

The mail from the Southward due on Thursday morning, and the Fredericton mail which should have been here yesterday morning, have not yet arrived.
